LONDON THISTLE CURLERS  
REORGANIZE FOR SEASON

A Large and Enthusiastic Meeting Held in North End Rink Last Evening—President R. D. McDonald Re-Elected—Amalgamation Discussed—London Club Offered Use of Thistle Rink.

Mr. R. D. McDonald was elected president of the London Thistle Curling Club for the fourth time at the annual meeting of the club held in the north end rink last evening. The meeting was a large and enthusiastic one. Several matters pertaining to the coming curling season and the amalgamation of the Thistle Bowling and Curling Clubs were discussed. A committee was also appointed for the purpose of extending the privileges of the Thistle rink to the members of the London Curling Club, who are without a rink at present owing to the recent fire at the fair grounds. It is proposed to offer the London Club full privileges of the Thistle rink without in any way depriving the rival club of its identity.

**Past Season a Success.**  
President McDonald made a brief opening address, in which he reviewed the successes of last season and the bowling season just passed. It had been a splendid year for the Thistle Club, and the large number of trophies displayed in the club room were mute evidence of this. He complimented the building committee on its splendid efforts resulting in the improvements made in the rink and the other committees for the different branches of work they had undertaken. The reports from the secretary and treasurer showed the club to be increasing in membership and of good financial condition.

**Amalgamation Discussed.**  
The proposed amalgamation of the bowling and curling departments of the club was outlined by Mr. Phil. Fetterley. A meeting of both departments will be held next Friday evening, and the details of the amalgamation completed.

Communications to the club were read by the secretary and were filed. One of them was from the Lindsay, Ont. club, one of the largest curling organizations in Canada, in which was announced a big bonspiel in that town commencing Jan. 12, 1914. Prizes

amounting to \$750 had been donated for this bonspiel.

**London Bonspiel To Be Held.**  
The meeting passed a vote of thanks to the building committee, composed of Messrs. Fetterley, Puddicombe, Tilson and Poole. The annual City of London bonspiel will be held again this winter, and visiting rinks will be entered free of charge. Wolgast Is Training  
Hard To Recover Title

Former Lightweight Champion Is On His Farm at Cadillac, Michigan, Working Hard To Regain Lost Laurels—Will Meet Ritchie Soon He Thinks.

Cadillac, Mich., Oct. 17.—Ad Wolgast is following the right trail in his fight to regain his lost lightweight crown. If there is any possibility whatsoever of his winning back the title he lost to Willie Ritchie, it will be definitely known before long. Ad is walking the straight and narrow. Immediately after beating up Bat Nelson at Milwaukee on Monday night, Wolgast hied himself to his farm near here. The little Michigan Wildcat claims that a year of reckless living had every bit as much to do with his defeat by Ritchie as that much-discussed operation for appendicitis.

**Is Taking Care of Himself.**  
Wolgast says that he already notices the difference since he has gotten down to earnest training and is taking care of himself. "Since beating Nelson, I'm feeling just about 200 times better than I ever imagined it possible to feel two months before I stepped into the ring at Milwaukee."

**Will Tackle Ritchie.**  
"I need about three or four good fights before tackling Ritchie," he said. "That's why I'm taking on both Charley White and Polts before the end of this month. I am hoping to get Ritchie into the ring no later than the 10th of next month, and I want to be as hard as possible for that battle. Some say I'm foolish to tackle a boy of White's ability, I figure that if I can't lick him and many others of the same calibre, I have no business meeting Ritchie in a championship bout. These boys should put me in just about the right sort of trim to regain the title, which I believe I lost to a man who has no business being in the same ring with me at the end of ten rounds."

Ad is receiving offers daily for fights from eastern clubs. He figures he is a better drawing-card at Milwaukee, however, and will box there as often as he can secure opponents.

Packey McFarland Easily Won From Tommy Murphy at Madison Square.

## CHICAGO FIGHTER CLEVER

Looked to Crowd That He Could Have Scored Knockout Had He Wanted To.

New York, Oct. 17.—In a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden, tonight Packey McFarland, of Chicago, outboxed and outfought Tommy Murphy, of this city, from start to finish, never giving Murphy a chance in any round. McFarland weighed 140 and Murphy 135 pounds.

**"Packey" Was Clever.**  
The Chicago fighter gave a clever exhibition of boxing throughout. In the first round Murphy was unable to reach his opponent with a clean blow, while McFarland rained left jabs and right hooks to the head and face. At close quarters Murphy's short arm work was cleverly blocked by McFarland, who acted as though he were giving a boxing lesson. Murphy was able to reach the body only a few times in the entire bout. He did not land a dozen clean blows, and there had no effect on the stockyards champion. Murphy was frequently carried across the ring with right hand smashes to the head and face, and at times he stood as if bewildered.

**Murphy Nearly Out.**  
Murphy appeared to tire in the sixth after receiving a hard right upper cut to the jaw. The crowd kept calling to McFarland to put him out, but McFarland contented himself with jabbing lefts to the face and hooking rights to the head, with an occasional hard left to the body. During the seventh and eighth McFarland frequently lapped Murphy in the face with the back of his right glove. It appeared as though the Chicago fighter could have brought the bout to a quicker termination had he so desired.

WHITE OR WOLGAST

Lightweight Champ Will Battle Winner of November 17 Bout.

## HAS ACCEPTED TERMS

Said They Contained a Guarantee of \$5,000, With 35 Per Cent. of the Gross Receipts.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 17.—Believing that the Chicago and Milwaukee fight enthusiasts are warming up to the fight game under the new Wisconsin boxing law, Tom Andrews, matchmaker for the Cream City, a leading fight club, arranged with Willie Ritchie to meet the winner of the White-Wolgast fight before his club in this city, Auditorium, on Nov. 17. The lightweight champion accepted the terms offered, and although they were not announced, it was said they contained a guarantee of \$5,000, with a privilege of 35 per cent. of the gross, minus the state's "bit." Wolgast has already challenged Ritchie to a fight here.

Andrews gave out a temporary schedule of the bouts which his club is trying to arrange for the winter season. They plan to hold six fights at the Auditorium during the winter, and they aim to have some sort of a title at stake in every battle. After the Ritchie set-to, a good middleweight card, bringing together two boxers who are leading in the race for the title, probably McGeorgy and George Chip, while another card will feature Johnny Kilbane against some good featherweight.

## LONDON LOOKS GOOD

Players Have Been Working Hard Under Coach Crawford, and They Are a Much Improved Team.

The London Rugby Club will put in another stiff practice at Tecumseh Park this afternoon and the line-up for Monday's game with the strong Toronto Argonauts intermediates will be picked. With today's workout the players should round into nice shape for the Toronto game, and under the tutelage of Coach Crawford, the former Toronto University player, the London team looks better now than at any time previous in the season.

**Argonauts Are Husky Bunch.**  
The game Monday should put the local club in great shape for the Petrolia and Sarnia battles for the district title. The Argonauts are a big husky bunch of players, and while the local club is not at all confident of beating them, it is determined to give the visitors the game of their lives, and to hold them to as low a score as possible. The Argonauts will be one of the strongest teams seen in London for some years. O'Hara, the fast outside wing, never goes through a game without making some sensational flying tackles, and he will be the man to watch on Monday.

The Argonauts are bringing twenty-five players with them, so it looks as if they were preparing for a hard game. They have a fast wing line and every player is a tackler. Their scrimmage is light, but very fast and aggressive. One of the features of the Argonauts' play is the famous fadeaway trick, which won the championship for Varsity two years ago. They have also a bunch of other tricks that make the game interesting for the spectators.

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
