



CHICAGOFIGHTER CLEVER

Looked to Crowd That He Could Have Scored Knockout Had He Wanted To.

New York, Oct. 17.-In a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden to-night Packey McFarland, of Chicago, outboxed and outfought Tommy Murphy, of this city, from start to finish, never giving Murphy a chance in any round. McFarland weighed 140 and Murphy 138 pounds.
"Packey" Was Clever.

The Chicago fighter gave a clever exhibition of boxing throughout. In the first round Murphy was unable to reach his opponent with a clean blow. while McFarland rained left jabs and right hooks to the head and face. At work was cleverly blocked by McFarand, who acted as though he were giving a boxing lesson. Murphy was able to reach the body only a few times in the entire fight. He did not had no effect on the stockyards' chain pion. Murphy was frequently carried across the ring with right hand smashes to the head and face, and a' times he stood as if bewildered Murphy Nearly Out.

Murphy appeared to tire in the sixth after receiving a hard right upper cut to the jaw. The crowd kept calling to McFarland to put him out, but Mc. Farland contented himself with jab oing lefts to the face and hooking ights to the head, with an occasiona ard left to the body. During the sev ith and eighth McFarland frequently lapped Murphy in the face with th ack of his right glove. It appeare as though the Chicago fighter could have brought the bout to a quicker ermination had he so desired.
