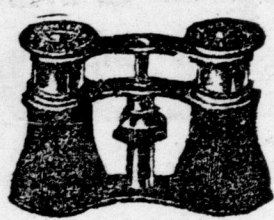

Board of Education Will Announce  
Aberdeen School Winner Today.

A special meeting of the board of  
education has been called for this af-  
ternoon to award the prizes for the  
plans of a new school to replace the  
Aberdeen school. The selection was  
made by No. 2 committee last week,  
and the board will probably ratify the  
choice. It is not known who is the for-  
tunate architect. Five have completed,  
with nine plans to choose from.

The report of No. 1 committee of the  
board fixing the salaries of the teach-  
ers in the annexed districts will be  
presented also.

## ASK TO FORECLOSE MORTGAGE ON THE L. & P. S. RAILWAY

City Council Will Ask Dominion  
Government For Power to  
Do This at Once.

ALD. RICHTER'S MOTION  
CARRIED BY ALDERMEN

By This Means the Possibility  
of Litigation Disappears—City  
Would Be Sole Owner.

The Dominion Government will be  
asked to foreclose the mortgage on  
the London and Port Stanley Rail-  
way and give the city absolute pos-  
session of it. At the same time, the  
Legislature will be asked to give the  
city permission to raise money to  
equip and operate the road, either by  
steam or electric power, subject to a vote  
of the taxpayers. This was the result  
of the city council's deliberations in  
the question last evening.

The resolution passed at the Lon-  
don and Port Stanley Board meeting  
in was presented to the council,  
recommending that an applica-  
tion be made to the Legislature to  
raise the money needed to equip and  
operate the line, either as an electric  
or a steam line. Which it was the peti-  
tion from over three score leading  
businessmen, asking that no action be  
taken until expert advice had been  
obtained on the question of the com-  
parative cost of operation by steam  
and electricity, and also on the attitude  
of the M. C. R. and Pere Mar-  
quette.

Ald. Rose at once moved that the  
petition be sent to the London and  
Port Stanley Board.

## Difficulty in the Way.

"The petition asks for expert ad-  
vice on certain questions," Ald. Rich-  
ter pointed out. "There is a great  
deal of difficulty in the way. The act  
states that all the money raised by  
the London and Port Stanley Board  
shall be turned over to the city.  
There is no provision for secur-  
ing expert advice. Our hands are  
tied in that matter. We cannot secure  
the information without expending  
the London and Port Stanley Board  
have not the money. This petition  
should be sent to No. 1 committee."  
"There is some doubt as to this,"  
opined Mayor Graham.

## Deal With Whole Question.

"These expenditures are incident to  
the collection of the money," Ald.  
Richter pointed out. "The question of  
securing expert advice is absolutely  
foreign to this. Now I want to deal  
with the whole question. The London  
and Port Stanley Board had a meet-  
ing today, going through the forms  
according to law. But at the same  
time, London is in rather an unen-  
viable position. Not only was the  
road, because of money advanced to  
it and mortgages held. We are in  
the position of stockholders, and vir-  
tually transact all the business, but  
at the same time we do not actually  
own the line. Our position is not very  
satisfactory to say the least. The  
Grand Trunk holds 50 per cent of the  
shares, but their representatives no  
longer attend the meetings of the  
shareholders. There are many other  
shares outstanding, but the holders do  
not attend the meetings. The city  
handles the whole business in an in-  
direct way. Seeing that we are deal-  
ing with it as if it were our own,  
why really it is not, would it not be  
better if we obtained actual pos-  
session of it, and put an end to the  
present farce of electing directors,  
etc. We are mortgagees in possession  
and liable at all times for an ac-  
counting. Therefore, we should  
might be questioned at any time, and  
the possibilities of a big suit are al-  
ways before us. It would be highly  
preferable to put the city in a posi-  
tion to deal with the road as its  
own property, and proper without this  
present trouble."

## Foreclose the Mortgage.

Ald. Richter then introduced a mo-  
tion, which after outlining the posi-  
tion of the road, the amount of the  
mortgage, etc., recommended that the  
Dominion Government be asked to  
foreclose, and that the Legislature be  
requested to give the city permission  
to equip it properly, either for steam  
or electricity.

"This will mean the formation of a  
new company, which would be the  
city, with the whole capital invested  
in the city," Ald. Richter continued.  
"The city would own the road, and  
any other asset. No person could ask  
for an accounting, and we would ob-  
viate the possibility of litigation. It leaves  
open the whole question of the future  
of the line. If the people desire to  
own the line, it can be done. If not,  
we can do what is considered the best  
thing. Then the question as to whether  
this council is properly consti-  
tuted or not would not effect the road  
in any form. We would not have to  
lease the line to a company, but from  
the London and Port Stanley Board."

## The Best Way.

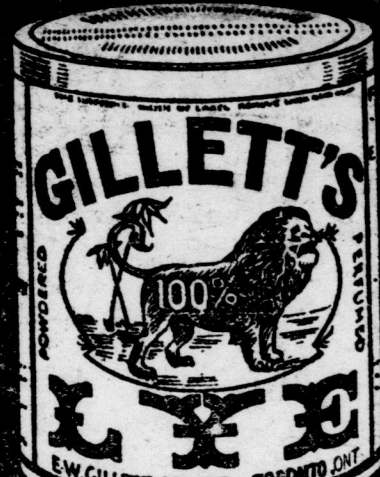
Ald. Spittal stated that when he  
first heard the motion he had come to  
the conclusion that it was simply an  
effort to delay the project, but on  
second thought he had come to the  
conclusion that it was the best way  
of getting rid of a troublesome prob-  
lem.

The motion of Ald. Richter carried  
without further discussion.

The railways and other persons in-  
terested in the future of the London  
and Port Stanley have until Feb. 20  
in which to offer bids for the lease  
of the road. Ald. Spittal and Ald.  
Saunders suggested that the date be  
fixed at Feb. 15. Ald. Bennett and  
Ald. Johnston wanted the time set  
at March 1. On motion of Ald. Glass  
a compromise was made, the date be-  
ing made Feb. 20.
