COULD NOT SAY BRUISES MADE BEFORE DEATH

Doctor Describes the Marks Found On Body of Carl Ahren's Wife.

POLICE COURT PACKED

Hearing of Evidence in Murder Charge Will Continue Saturday.

KITCHENER, Ont., Dec. 9.—In expectation of new evidence in the case of Carl Ahrens, charged with the murder of his wife, the police court was jammed to the doors with hundreds of spectators standing when the preliminary hearing was resumed this afternoon.

William H. Matthews, undertaker, Carleton Place, who conducted the funeral, and who was present when Dr. Laidlaw of Ottawa made the subsequent autopsy, testified that there were superficial marks on the nose, eyes, right cheek and limbs. Deceased was formerly Miss Armour of Carleton Place.

Dr. Laidlaw of Ottawa, testified that he made the post-mortem on December 1, two weeks after death, and three hours after exhumation. Witness stated that rigidity prevailed throughout the body owing to the process of embalming. He did not find proper rigor mortis. In addition to the wounds caused by embalming there was a number of small superficial marks indicating slight violence sustained some time antecedent to tissue death.

Describes Bruises. These were as follows: Mark one-half inch to the right of the angle of the right eye; a circular mark on the right side of the nose; an abrasion on the right side of the nose; a circular abrasion through the skin at the middle of the anterior margin of the right nostril; a linear abrasion over the bone at the right side of the skull; an abrasion under the center of the collarbone on the skin and directed toward the left armpit; a circular bruise overlying the last rib in the mid-auxiliary line; an oval-shaped bruise on the right hip; a circular bruise near the long bone of the thigh; a circular bruise on the outer aspect of the left thigh, and another circular bruise above the last.

"Are you able to say that any of these bruises were ante-mortem?" asked Crown Prosecutor Gordon Waldron, K.C., of Toronto. "I would include all these bruises in the summary of ante-mortem marks," was the reply.

When Were Bruises Made? Explaining that the bruises were caused some time before the death of the tissues, the doctor said this was not necessarily before the death of the body.

"Are you able to say if any of these were made before the death of the person?"

"No."

"Is there any way of telling that?"

"No."

Witness said that all the marks might be caused by a pole, oar or a blunt piece of wood.

Those on the legs might be caused by lifting the body into the boat.

He gathered that no pressure had been applied to the neck. In so far as he could judge, after embalming, there had been no choking.

In his judgment the autopsy should have been made before embalment. "It would have led to more determinate results."

Further questioned, the doctor said that persons who were in terror and were suddenly plunged into cold water might die.

In his opinion the added buoyancy imparted by deceased's fur coat might have prevented her from sinking so rapidly as an unclothed body.

Struggle Under Ice.

Cross-examined by H. J. Sims, K.C., there was nothing in the condition of the body which was inconsistent with the theory of death by drowning. It was possible that persons struggling under the ice would be able to break through two and one-half inches because they would in their excitement use double the efforts of a person trying to break the ice from above, especially in shallow water.

Mrs. N. Weber, the next witness, told of hearing a yell and a scream a short time after Ahrens had borrowed a punt. She could not say if the first cry was of a man or woman, but it was fainter than the second.

Policy of \$50,000 Not Issued.

After the second shout witness heard a splashing in the water. When Ahrens returned he told her that the boat had gone down the river, and in reply to her inquiry as to where his wife was drowned, he said, "She's gone." He appeared shocked with a wild look about him. "I asked him if the boat tipped, but he made no reply."

Alfred N. Mitchell, assistant general superintendent of the Canada Life Assurance Company, Toronto, stated that Ahrens had a policy on his life for \$50,000, taken out in April, 1920, and payable to his mother. There had been an application in November last made on behalf of the late wife for a \$50,000 policy with Carl Ahrens named as beneficiary. The policy was not issued and the premium was returned. "We do not issue policies payable to husbands on wives," said the witness. The crown had several more witnesses to call. It is expected that the hearing will continue tomorrow.

WORK STARTED ON KENORA ROAD

WINNIPEG, Dec. 9.—To help relieve unemployment in Ontario, initial work on the construction of Ontario's end of the highway between Kenora and Winnipeg was started Friday at Kenora, Peter Heenan, M.L.A., for Kenora, announced here today.

A stretch of thirty miles will be built from Kenora to Milepost 24 at the boundary. Sixty miles of road, between Vermilion and Wabigoon, has already been built. The principle behind the construction of this highway, Mr. Heenan said, was to open the country for settlement and provide direct road communication with Winnipeg for summer traffic.

EARTHQUAKES IN ITALY REPORTED

ROME, Dec. 9.—Serious earthquake shocks have been reported throughout this week, from the regions around the Lake of Bolsena, about 60 miles northwest of this city.

No deaths have been reported.

Used His Shoe As a Safety Deposit Vault For His Fortune.

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 9.—Facing a term of two months in jail because he had only two cents, American money, in his pocket to pay a fine and costs, amounting in all to \$25, for imbibing too freely of brandy, while en route from Detroit to this city, the first leg of a journey which was to take him home to Denmark, E. Roeborg, solved the difficulty quite suddenly in police court this morning by solemnly leaning over and extracting sufficient money from his shoe to buy his freedom.

Roeborg was arrested for being intoxicated while on a M. C. R. train. When taken from the train he began to fight and it was necessary to handcuff him. Although he could speak no English Roeborg, in some manner, had accumulated a small fortune while in America and was taking it to his homeland in his shoe.

ORDERS ILLINOIS MAN DEPORTED

WINDSOR, Dec. 9.—Charged with kidnapping his four-year-old daughter from Kankakee, Ill., Ernest J. Piper, 34 years old, former resident of Kankakee, was ordered extradited by County Judge Coughlin at Sandwich Friday afternoon.

Piper, who has resided at Sandwich three months, left Kankakee six months ago, taking with him Evelyn, his daughter, who had been placed in the custody of his sister by an Illinois court.

Barrister W. H. Furlong of Windsor, counsel for Piper, gave notice that he will move for habeas corpus to secure release, and Judge Coughlin allowed a stay of extradition for fifteen days. Pending an appeal to the Ontario supreme court, Piper will be held at Sandwich jail.

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LIBERALS MAY JOIN FARMERS

Rumored To Be Seeking Premier Drury For Ontario House Leader.

LABOR WING REVOLTING

CHATHAM, Dec. 9.—Rumors of a rapprochement between Liberals and Progressives at Ottawa have given rise to conjecture as to whether the Ontario followers of Mackenzie King in their search for a new chieftain to lead them in the provincial legislature may perhaps seek to woo no less a personage than Premier Drury.

It is pointed out that Mr. Drury is a former Liberal whose outlook on politics is still Liberal in character. It is further noted that there are signs of insurgency in the labor wing of his party. During the last session of the legislature, George G. Halcrow, M.P., P., East Hamilton and L.P., house leader, voted against his nominal chieftain on practically every close division. Sergeant-Major Joseph McNamara, Riverdale and M. MacBride, Brant, have already deserted the coalition and there are not wanting other indications.

With the imminent probability of Liberal vicelies in the by-elections of North Oxford and with the possibility that Liberals may also carry the

once Conservative stronghold of Kingston, an alliance between farmers and Liberals would prove increasingly acceptable to the government.

Such a realignment of the forces in the houses would give the government a much-needed majority and relieve it from its present precarious position.

Exclusive of the speaker, there are 110 members in the legislature. Of these, 55 are at present on the Farmer-Labor benches. Should the 44 U. P. O. members unite with the 33 Liberals they would present a part of 72 votes to the 38 votes commanded by the opposition, provided that all of the eleven Labor members should decide to join their two former colleagues now sitting to the left of the speaker.

tion there was for the current rumor, both Premier Drury and Wellington Hay, acting leader of the Liberal party, declined to commit themselves. Neither would indicate what their attitude would be towards such a proposal.

Premier Drury said that if any such move was afoot information concerning it should be sought from the Liberals.

Wellington Hay, on his part, stated that he had heard nothing of any such proposal and that personally at least nothing was farther from his own thoughts.

REPORT DEATH IN CHICAGO STRIKE

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—The first death from violence in the stockyards strike was reported today. George Pile, a laborer, died in the County Hospital from wounds received Wednesday night when the police say, he was shot by a motorcycle policeman after he had thrown bricks at the officer.

The situation assumed a brighter aspect today, with optimistic statements from the packers and no reports of violence. According to the packing-house officials the strikers are returning to work, and these with new employees have placed the plants on a nearly normal working basis.

ADVISES ADOPTION OF "DEATH" CELL

HAMILTON, Dec. 9.—In its present mood to Judge Snyder today the grand jury recommended that a central place be selected for keeping prisoners under death sentence. This was endorsed by his honor.

BANDITS GIVEN 7 YEARS, 14 LASHES

MONTREAL, Dec. 9.—Patrick O'Hara, alias George McVittie, and Albert Slade of Hamilton, Ont., were this afternoon found guilty in the court of special sessions of robbing the Mount Royal avenue branch of the Molsons Bank on August 12 of \$2,500. Slade and O'Hara were sentenced to the lash and seven years in the penitentiary. Seven strokes of the lash will be administered just after they are admitted to the penitentiary, and seven just before they are discharged.

GOVERNOR OPENS HOME FOR STAFF

BRANTFORD, Dec. 9.—His Honor Lieut.-Governor Cockshut this afternoon formally declared the new \$30,000 staff residence of the Brant Sanatorium open. Members of the board of governors, the staff, the I. O. D. E. and many citizens took part in the opening day reception. Mayor Wadlake, President Chris. Cooke of the board of governors, and others addressed the assembly. Mrs. Gordon Smith is regent of Brant Chapter, I. O. D. E., which had charge of equipping the residence.
