KITCHENER VETS WIN S. P. A. TROPHY

Old Ex-Champs Totter Through To 4-2 Win Over Varsity.

Toronto, Dec. 20.—Outplaying the University of Toronto team in the last two periods the Kitchener seniors won tonight's game, 4 to 2, and became holders of the Sportsman's Patriotic Association trophy.

The blue and white played as well as in any previous game this season and led at the end of the opening period by 1 to 0, but their best on this occasion was not good enough to defeat the "mystery" team organized by Harry Wimer.

Tonight's game was just about the best senior tilt of the season, although the goals were not so numerous as in the game between Aura Lee and Varsity which required overtime to settle. The showing, however, made by Aura Lee, Varsity and Kitchener in the series awakened the fans to the possibilities of the O. H. A. race developing into one of the best in years. BASKET BALL QUIZ by Referee

TOSS-UP.

If the referee is unable to determine which player touched the ball before it went out of bounds, what is the proper way of continuing play?

EXTRA PERIOD.

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Roach, Arbor and Procter Rush Well, But Fail To Combine.

Ottawa, Dec. 20.—By defeating St. Patricks of Toronto by the score of 7 to 2 at the arena tonight, Ottawa Senators obtained sweet revenge for the overtime defeat at the hands of the Hamilton Tigers in the opening game of the season. The game was not very fast hockey, at times being particularly listless, but occasional flashes by the different players served to keep up the interest. The game was played under the patronage of His Excellency the Governor-General and Lady Byng of Vimy.

The governor-general and 6,000 persons were kept shivering for half an hour, as the train carrying the Toronto players was late. The all-day trip had its effect on the visitors. They showed very little of their renowned goal-scoring combination work, and their boring-in tactics were confined to individual rushes.

Roach, whose work created such a favorable impression on the western fans, found the going rather tough, and did not appear to be at ease. Both Babe Dye and Noble have been seen to better advantage, the work of the former, however, being the best of the visitors' attacking line. Jack Adams, last year's leading goal-getter in the Pacific Coast League, made his initial effort in this series.

Nighbor bore the brunt of the attack for the Senators, his chief assistant being Broadbent. Broadbent came through with flashes of his old play, but his shooting was off. It was the concerted attack of the Ottawa defense, led alternately by Eddie Gerard and George Boucher, and sometimes both, that led to the undoing of St. Patrick's. This pair was responsible for three of the local goals, their last two being of a particularly snappy variety.
