Victoria, perhaps more than any other city in the Dominion, needs a progressive Mayor and an intelligent and enterprising City Council.

Situated as it is and with such a salubrious and, at the same time, delightful climate, Victoria would, if it had a good city government, be the ideal residential city to thousands of both Canadians and United States citizens.

Victoria should be such a city as this for the sake of those who live in it now. If it were only for the comfort, the convenience and the health of its present inhabitants its affairs ought to be conducted on enlightened principles.

Some of the accusers would like to spend and are willing to spend it in glad to live in it, merely as an investment, spend money in making it healthy and attractive.

Victoria wants many improvements, and its progress and prosperity require that it should have those improvements; but it will never get them if its affairs are placed in the hands of men who do not know what the requirements of a good residential city are, and who exhaust their energies and strain their intellects, such as they are, in studying how effectively they can starve the different departments of the city government.
