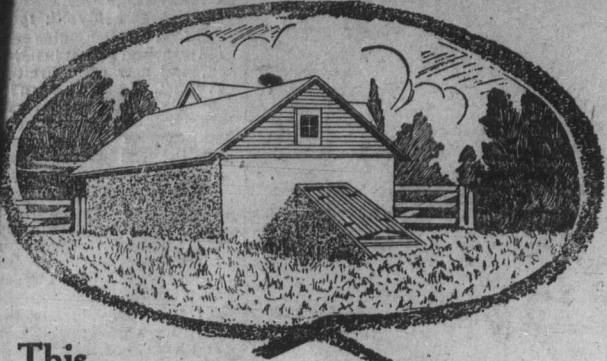

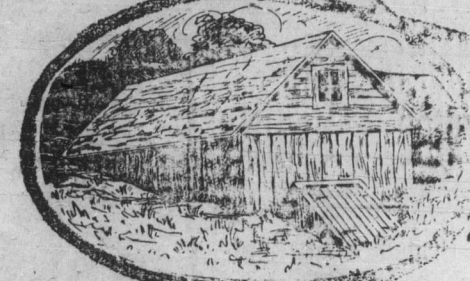

HOME RULE PLEDGE HAS BEEN GIVEN REDMOND BY PREMIER

Irish Leader's Cable to Australia Lends Color to This Report O'Connor Claims Support of All Canadian Ministers.

London, Nov. 26.—Some light has at last been thrown on the nature of the compact between the Liberal government and the Nationalist party. John Redmond in a message to the Irish people in Australia, says: "Victory means for Ireland immediate home rule."

This is taken as an indication not only that the Liberal leaders are standing by their pledges on the Irish question, but that Premier Asquith has promised Mr. Redmond, in return for the Nationalists' support that the Liberals, if

returned to power at the coming election, will introduce a home rule bill at the earliest possible opportunity after the veto power of the House of Lords has been swept away.

At a meeting of the United Irish League, T. P. O'Connor challenged the Tories to produce a single prime minister or cabinet minister in the Canadian provinces who does not believe the honor and safety of the British Empire demand the concession of home rule.

TOWN COUNCIL AWARDED TENDER

Water System Will be Extended to Relief Cottages.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Friday evening last.

A letter from W. A. R. Cragg of Dalhousie stating that a local company which was interested in the development of the water power at Charlo Falls would have two or three hundred horsepower for sale and asked the town council to consider a proposition. This was referred to the Electric Light Committee.

D. F. Graham was appointed assessor for ward 2 in place of Mr. Lutz, resigned.

S. D. Harriman was awarded the contract of extending the water main to the relief cottages. The price was a little over \$2,100. This with the material will make the whole work cost a little over \$4,000.

Engineer Chandler's plan of all the town north of the I. C. R. was submitted.

The following resolution was adopted unanimously:—

Whereas this council has been notified by the Relief Committee of the town that the Government of Canada intends placing the sum of seventy thousand dollars in the estimates during the session of Parliament for the relief of the town of Campbellton and whereas it is deemed advisable by this Council that the said sum of seventy thousand dollars be used to pay the interest on the bonded debt of the town.

Therefore resolved that when the said sum of seventy thousand dollars shall be received by this Council, the said amount be placed in some bank or other financial institution, and that the sum of eight thousand dollars be withdrawn yearly, and every year for the payment of the interest on the said bonded debt.

And further resolved that application be made to the Legislature of the province of New Brunswick at the coming session for legislation to carry into effect the provisions of this resolution.

A committee was appointed to interview Premier Hazen and discuss town matters.

The Council then adjourned.

ESCAPED FROM INDUSTRIAL HOME

Moncton, Nov. 28.—Chief Ridout was this morning in receipt of a phone message from Fred E. McDonald, Supt. of the Boys' Industrial Home, St. John, asking to have a watch kept for three boys who had escaped on Saturday night and were supposed to be heading this way.

The boys' names were John Copeland of Campbellton, George Eitel and Gordon Kay, aged 14, 16 and 15 respectively. Copeland is described as light complexioned and about 5 feet tall, Eitel, tall, of medium complexion, with heavy dark hair, and Kay's mark of identification is a cut from the nose downward that looks like a hair lip.

Copeland is an old offender. He escaped once before this fall and was captured by the Moncton police on October 24th and was taken back to St. John on the following day.

BOARD OF TRADE REORGANIZED

Active Steps Taken to Place Organization on Sound Basis.

A meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Council Chambers Monday evening and a goodly number of citizens were present.

President George G. McKenzie, who leaves shortly for Montreal, where he will embark in business in his own behalf tendered his resignation, which was accepted.

A hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mr. J. Harquail and seconded by F. M. Anderson to President McKenzie for his good work while president of the Board.

Mr. McKenzie responded.

The matter of reorganization was discussed and it was decided to take immediate steps to place the Board in good standing.

J. Y. Mercereau of Chatham brought up the matter of better town service on the north shore, and the matter was discussed and referred to the executive.

Mr. John Harquail was elected president to fill the vacancy caused by Pres. McKenzie's resignation.
