By the general regulations for the guidance and government of the officers and other persons employed in the postal services of the Dominion of Canada it is provided (p. 64): The transmission of obscene or immoral books, papers, publications, photographs, or prints through the post is strictly prohibited, and all packets containing such articles should be stopped and sent specially under cover to the postmaster general.

The instructions from Ottawa are very plain and are in black and white, and as long as these gentlemen of the public service allow them to pass through their hands so long will the Toronto News company, or other news companies, handle them.
