

YORK COUNTY COUNCIL.

CONCLUSION OF THE JUNE SESSION ON SATURDAY.

The Association of the County Finally Settled—The Report of the Finance Committee—The High Park Tramway.

The county council held the closing sitting of the June session at the courthouse on Saturday, Warden Rowen presiding. A motion to adjourn at the conclusion of the day's sitting until Nov. 11 was lost, as was also a motion asking the appointment of John Keogh to act with the overseer of Peel in superintending certain works in the township of King.

In committee of the whole council resumed the consideration of the equalization committee's report. The report contained a schedule of rates for the year 1914, and a list of the various townships and villages to be assessed. The following table shows the total qualified value of realty, personally and income:

The representatives of York made strenuous efforts to have the assessment of that township reduced, but without effect. After much argument the above figures struck by the committee were adopted.

The council went into committee of the whole on a report of the committee on county property. The first clause of the report, recommending the commissioners of county property to take into account upon the liability of the county for any accidents on sidewalks and approaches across ditches and crossings in the several municipalities through which the York road ran, was passed.

Three pairs of handcuffs were ordered to be purchased for the sheriff's office. The council went into committee on a report of the committee on finance and assessment on the following clause: The rent of the York road, gate 4, Yonge street, was reduced. John Hickey, owner of the Parkdale gate, asked for \$1250 damages for the loss of the gate.

A Bad State of Things. In giving judgment on Saturday morning in a case of Dobby v. Hayes, the judge on the queen's bench side admonished strongly to the improper framing and conduct of a section in the Hayes case, which the criminal and civil law, but it put in force for the same purpose.

DR. WILD AND PALESTINE
