PROPOSED BY-LAW, "General Consolidated Loan Debentures"

To Provide for the Issue of "General Consolidated Loan Debentures" TO THE AMOUNT OF \$51,000, FOR THE PURPOSES OF PURSUING A SITE AND ERECTING A CATTLE MARKET THEREON.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, in the forty-second year of Her Majesty's reign, and chapter seventy-five, entitled "An Act respecting the Debt of the City of Toronto," it is amongst other things, enacted that the Corporation of the City of Toronto may pass a By-law or By-laws for authorizing the issue of Debentures of the said City for a sum not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$50,000, to redeem certain outstanding debentures therein specified, and other payments for permanent improvements therein also specified, and that any balance or residue thereof not required for the purposes aforesaid may be applied or expended in improvements of like nature, the whole issue being nevertheless limited to the said sum of \$50,000;

And whereas the limitation of the issue of debentures to the said sum of \$50,000 was based on the assessment of the City not exceeding at the time of passing of the said Act the sum of \$20,000, and it is further enacted that any increase of the debt by a further issue of debentures might be made when said assessment should exceed the said sum of \$50,000, such increase being nevertheless limited to eight per centum of such amount of the whole rateable property in the City of Toronto, respectively of any future increase of the same, and also irrespective of any income in the nature of tolls, interest or dividends from the work, or from any stock, share or securities of any kind which the Corporation may acquire or may hereafter acquire, and also irrespective of any income to be derived from the temporary investment of the sinking fund heretofore mentioned, or any part thereof, according to the last revised Assessment Roll of the said City, being for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, is \$68,923,277;

And whereas the General Debenture Debt of the City, as controlled by the said Act, and exclusive of Local Improvements debt, secured by special rates, and assessments amounting to \$6,524,994, leaving a full margin for the increase of the same in manner hereinafter mentioned, and of which debt no part of the principal or interest is in arrear;

And whereas it is expedient and necessary to raise by loan on the credit of the said City a sum of money for the purpose of effecting certain permanent improvements in the said City, together with interest thereon at the rate of four per cent. per annum for forty years;

And whereas the estimated cost of the said improvements is \$51,000, made up as follows: For procuring a site and erecting, constructing and making the buildings and other works and improvements necessary for a new Cattle Market, \$51,000 up to and whereof it will require the sum of \$2,040 to be raised annually for a period of forty years by the issue of the debentures to be issued under and by virtue of this By-law, to pay the interest of the said debt, and the sum of \$382.50 to be raised annually during the same period for the forming of a sinking fund of three-fourths of one per centum per annum for the payment of the debt created by this By-law, according to the provisions of the above recited Act, making in all the sum of \$2,422.50 to be raised annually as aforesaid;

And whereas it is necessary that such annual sum of \$2,422.50 shall be raised and levied upon the rateable property in the Municipality of the City of Toronto; Therefore the Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto enacts as follows: I. That it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Municipality to raise by way of loan, upon the security of the debentures hereinafter mentioned, from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of such debentures, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of fifty-one thousand dollars (\$51,000), and to issue the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said City, for the purpose and with the objects above recited.

That it shall be lawful for the said Mayor to cause any number of debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required, either in currency or sterling money, not less than one hundred dollars each, or twenty pounds sterling each, and not exceeding in the whole the sum of fifty-one thousand dollars (\$51,000), as in the preceding section mentioned, and that the said debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the said Corporation, and be signed by the said Mayor and Treasurer.
