The importance of opening this continent with a complete line of railway is not yet fully realized. It is true that this complex transcontinental line would be a great boon to Canada more firmly than any other agent could have done; that it has stimulated trade in all parts of the Dominion, and that it has opened up for thirty millions the fertile bonanza of the West.

A great change is taking place in the trade routes of the world. Japan, not many years ago the isolation of these countries was complete. Their ports were closed to the outside world and their foreign commerce did not amount to a negligible figure.

Japan, too, is showing a wonderful aptitude to trade with other nations. Since 1854, when Commodore Perry first opened the country to the world, Japan has made great strides in her foreign commerce.
