LICENSE LEGISLATION,

Justice Belanger Makes a Decision Favo MONTREAL, May 30.-Mr. Justice Belanger of Beauharnois has decided that the article of the Quebec statutes giving municipa councils the power to pass bylaws prohibit councils the power to pass bylaws prohibiting the retailing of liquor within their jurisdiction is beyond the power of the provincial legislature, the B.N.A. Act having reserved that right to the Parliament of Canada. The Court therefore declared the bylaw of the municipality of Huntingdon prohibiting retailing of liquor null and void. The Privy Council in 1878 decided, on the contrary, that the provinces have the right to pass license acts and the Supreme Court of Canada in 1885 held that the license act of 1883 was beyond the powers of the Federal Parliament but appertained to the provinces.

IN CALIFORNIA. At Least 25 Persons Lose Their Lives-A Train Plunges Into the Water-Some of the Bodies Identified-Intense Ex-SAN FRANCISCO, May 30,-One of the most horrible railway accidents ever known in California occurred at 1.40 p.m., when the

The first car, which had followed the engine to the bottom of the muddy estuary, soon rose an i such of the passengers as had escaped were picked up by yachts and boats which gathered at the scene. The trainment and the rest of the passengers aided in the work of rescuing, and when the wrecking train arrived from Oakland the car was drawn into shallow watter and the boats began dragging the creek for bodies. The train was in charge of Conductor Rearath, an extra crew in it, being a holiday.

The conductor stated that probably persons had met their death. The top of the passenger coach was cut open. As soon as it was raised above the water and the work of sons had met their death. The top of the passenger coach was cut open. As soon as it was raised above the water and the work of removing the bodies commenced ten were taken out in quick succession. Engineer Dunn and his irreman were both saved. Three women and three girls were taken from the water alive and removed to the receiving hospital. Another young lady died soon after being taken from the water. The news of the accident created intense excitement in Oakland and thousands of people flocked to the morgue and to the scene of the wreck. At the morgue the bodies were laid out as soon as received to await identification. The body of E. P. Robinson, which was among those taken from

await identification. The body of E. P. Robinson, which was among those taken from the hole cut in the roof of the car, was among the first removed and was taken in charge by Coroner Evers. The bodies of six men and two women were brought in soon after, some, of the bodies being at first left at the receiving hospital, where the injured were also taken. In a short time 13 bodies lay on the floor and on the marble slabs of the Morgue awaiting identification. Many heartrending scenes were witnessed as the friends came forward to claim their dead.
