HE SAYS IT IS HOG CHOLERA

DR. ALLEN ISSUES HIS REPORT ON THE SWINE EPIDEMIC.

The World's Disclosures Created a Good Deal of Uneasiness—Pork is Not Much on Call at the Restaurants—But the General Public Will Be Benefited in the Long Run.

The startling revelations which appeared in the "World" of yesterday regarding the sale of meat with disease in Toronto, created a good deal of uneasiness and was the topic of conversation all over the city.

The telephone at the Health Department was rung from morning until evening, and the quizzers asking if it were safe to eat any kind of meat. Officials of the Provincial Board of Health who received their first intimation of the case, were early on hand for further particulars, but little more was to be had, until the commission was brought in.

So far as known the disease is confined to the large hog farms situated to the east of the city and especially those situated on the Plains of Danforth-road. The proprietors of some of these farms produced the carcasses of their hogs from those that came into the city in a condition, bristled and bristled, and were found to be infected with the disease.

The last case of hog cholera brought to the notice of the Provincial Board of Health was that of a hog owned by Mr. John White, of the Plains of Danforth-road. It was found to be infected with the disease, and the animal was killed and buried.

Some Excellent Animals. All the farmers around the city, however, do not produce pork in this way. The very finest grades that is handled is raised in the immediate vicinity, but few dealers being asked about the source of the meat, they have not been so particular as to the source of the meat.

Hog Cholera is the disease most experimented with and infected with hog cholera. It was brought to Toronto by animals from the West, and it is rapidly spreading in a herd of 100 which is being treated to the animal.

Dr. Allen's Report. The following is Dr. Allen's report on the matter: To the chairman and members of the Local Board of Health.

Microscopic examination of the lungs showed the disease to be one of typhoid, and in the third stage. The heart lesions signify influenza, and the character of the interstitial pneumonia is that of the typhoid type.

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ENGLAND'S POSTMASTER DEAD.

Struck Down by Electricity.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The Right Hon. Henry Cecil Raikes, M.P., Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, died today. For some time past he had been gradually recovering from a severe illness which had necessitated his resignation from office duty, but yesterday he went out walking, when he received a severe electric shock during a thunderstorm.

On arriving home his condition was pronounced critical, and the right hon. gentleman never rallied. His death does not occur a Cabinet vacancy, but leaves a blank in the Ministerial ranks.

The deceased statesman was the eldest son of the late Mr. Henry Raikes, of Liverpool, Flintshire; he was born in 1838 and was a lawyer by profession. From 1865 to 1870 he was a member of the House of Commons, and in 1870 he was appointed to the office of Postmaster-General.
