

DOINGS AT BRIDGE HALL.

Trouble Between the Waterbury Watch Company and Its Agent.

A. W. Crump of 35 Wellington-street east, agent of the Waterbury Watch Company for the Dominion of Canada, is in hot water. The Waterbury Company entered into an agreement with Mr. Crump in August, 1891, for one year, they to advance goods and collect all moneys, he to sell the goods. In June last he went over to Waterbury and informed the company he could not continue to act as agent for them, as he was losing money by it, and asked them to send over a man to take over the stock and relieve him. This the company did, and an agent arrived a few days ago. Mr. Crump was found to have on hand 23 watches complete, 231 aluminum cases, 72 nickel cases, 48 silver cases and 47 gold cases, and a number of smaller articles, amounting altogether in value to \$4100. But Mr. Crump changed his mind suddenly, so it is alleged, and refused to give up possession of the stock unless paid \$3000, and further threatened to expose the company to the customs authorities for irregularities in bringing goods into Canada. The company at once sent an agent to Ottawa, who saw the Minister of Customs and found that all was right so far as was known. The next step was to apply to solicitors, and yesterday McCarthy & Co., acting on behalf of the company, issued a writ and got an order to the Sheriff of Toronto to require the goods. In the affidavit filed it is sworn that Crump collected money contrary to the agreement and did not account for same and that he admits having collected \$370; that 134 watches are unaccounted for and that the defendant says they must have been stolen. When the Sheriff makes the seizure, having first taken security from the plaintiff for the value of the goods claimed, and makes his return to the Queen's Bench Division the matter will again come before the courts.

A motion for an injunction in the action of Buck v. Grundy was enlarged. The plaintiff has for some time manufactured a store called "The Happy Thought," and the defendant has lately given to the public a store called "The Happy Dream." The plaintiff wishes to restrain the defendant from using this name.

VETERAN CONSTABLE HEALEY.

He Has Been Serving for 47 Years as Soldier and Constable.

"Well, I guess this will be the last Union Station I shall do any soldiering in," remarked Mr. George Healey, the veteran Grand Trunk constable, to The World yesterday. "And I don't suppose I shall do any in this next world. I don't suppose there will be any stations there, and even if there should be I won't care about going on duty."

"How long have you been doing station duty?"

"Going on 37 years, and during that time I have done duty in every Union Station this city ever saw. The first Union station, I can tell you, was a pretty small affair. It was no larger than that car there," he added, pointing to a passenger car standing on the centre track of the depot, "and the platform was only about five feet wide. The leading hotel at that time was the old Seward house, which stood on the site of the present Queen's Hotel, and its bus used to back up close to this platform. The track at that time ran along Front-street."

"Yes, I have been a long time soldiering. I put in 11 years in the British army, coming here from the Crimea. Then I served nine years on the Toronto police force, during which time I was doing duty at the railway station. Now I am in my 47th year as Grand Trunk constable. Thus, you will see, I have been soldiering for nearly 47 years. A pretty long stretch, isn't it?" he concluded as he turned around and glanced at his well-known stentorian. "A-a-a! ab-o-o-r-d for Uxbridge, Lindsay, Cobocook and Midland!"

THE CITY COUNCIL'S LEIMARGE.

Justice Robertson Refers to it in Giving Judgment in Ashbridge's Bay.

The motion for an injunction in Coleman v. the City of Toronto came up again yesterday before Mr. Justice Robertson. The action arose out of the pollution of Ashbridge's Bay, and the plaintiff asked for an injunction to restrain the draining of further sewage into the bay by the city of Toronto, and for a mandatory order to compel the authorities to dredge the bay and let the sewage now collected seep.

On behalf of the city it was proven that a contract had been entered into with the Toronto Dry Dock Company to drain the bay, and that all sewage entering the bay was to be despoiled. His Lordship made some not very complimentary remarks regarding the manner in which the City Council was in the habit of dealing with like matters and the great shoveling of the city was in all things and said that we were now threatened with a great epidemic, which if it struck this continent would be sure to reach Toronto, owing to the cesspool at Ashbridge's Bay, and the city would be swept from east to west. Judgment was given directing that a mandatory order be issued to the city to stop the effluent being allowed to drain into the bay, and to be applied to again two weeks from yesterday, and in the meantime matters stand just as they are. The motion, so far as it asks to have the city restrained from permitting further sewage to drain into the bay, was dismissed.

THE COURT HOUSE DISPUTE.

An Interim Injunction for One Week Granted.

In the action of the court house contractors against the City of Toronto and Architect Lennox, an interim injunction was granted by Judge Robertson yesterday for one week in the terms of the endorsement on the writ. The city will appear on the motion next Friday to have the injunction continued. The city was not notified of the application made yesterday.

Ontario Veterinary College.

The annual announcement of the Ontario Veterinary College for the session of 1892-93 has been issued. This is probably the most unique educational institution in the Dominion, for no other covers so big a territory. Not alone do its students own all parts of the Dominion for their abiding places, but a great proportion of the students come from all over the United States. Prof. Andrew Smith, the veteran veterinarian, the founder of the college, is principal, and is assisted by an efficient staff of demonstrators and lecturers. The college was established in 1884, and is a monument to the indomitable and brainy principal.

They were assured that no rental would be charged till next year, as the cars will not run on that line till then.

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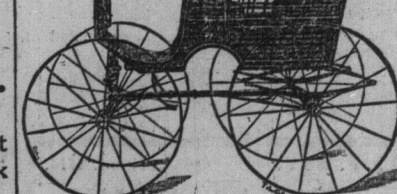
