Edouard Albion (Harold Meek) Will Be Director
CLASSES IN SINGING
By Brilliant Canadian, Who Is Director of Washington Opera Company

Edouard Albion, general director of the Washington Opera Company, whose success in producing community opera before the most brilliant audiences in the United States capital, has been heralded throughout that country, will this summer open a School of Music at Port Stanley, July 15 to September 15.

He was well known in musical circles in Canada before his recent achievements in the United States as a successful concert artist, an impresario of extraordinary ability, and an unexcelled expert in voice production had given him the continental reputation he now enjoys. MOTHER JOYFUL OVER VERDICT

Scene in Montreal Court When Son Acquitted
MANS LAUGHTER CHARGE

Ernest Paquette Arraigned Following Fatal Auto Ride

MONTREAL, July 1. — (Canadian Press Dispatch.) — Ernest Paquette, charged with manslaughter, in connection with the death of Victor Despatie, who was killed in an accident near Bordeaux, September 15 last, was last night acquitted by a King's bench jury. The court was startled by a piercing cry of joy uttered by Paquette's aged mother on hearing the verdict.

On the night of September 14 Paquette drove a car containing six girls and a man to Bordeaux. The next morning, as the party was returning to the city, Victor Despatie, who worked at the hotel, where the party had been staying, asked to be taken back in the car. He was given a seat, and a short distance from Bordeaux, when rounding a sharp curve, the car swerved and turned a complete somersault, according to a witness, throwing its occupants out into the road. Despatie was killed outright and several others of the party injured.

Paquette admitted having had a few drinks, but denied that he was under the influence of liquor at the time of the accident.

FINE TERMINAL AT PORT STANLEY

L. & P. S. Arranges to Care for Big Crowds

ELIMINATES DANGER
Big Improvement Made at the Beach Station

One of the best, if not the best, terminals in Canada is that which has just been completed by the London Railway Commissioners at Port Stanley for the convenience of the thousands of Londoners who visit the lakeside resort every season. The improvements, which have been completed this week at a cost of approximately \$8,000 will make it impossible for any accidents to happen while the trains are loading at the beach. Members of the commission as well as the general public have been fearful in past years that the passengers would be seriously injured if not killed in some of the rushes for the incoming trains. This danger is now entirely eliminated.

TRACKS ENCLOSED.
An enclosure has been formed around the two tracks on the beach extending through to the first cross street from the end of the line. On either side of the two tracks are concrete platforms extending the length of the five coaches. At the end of the enclosure are large gates, which will be opened to allow incoming passengers to quickly pass through to the beach. At the south side is the entrance to the platforms, where all outgoing passengers must show their tickets before being allowed to pass through to the beach. A ticket office and refreshment booth has been erected close to this gate. In former years it was necessary to go to Bridge street station to secure tickets. When a train arrives at the beach the large end gates will be opened, and the passengers will quickly pass outside of the enclosure. Then, when the entrance gate at the side will be opened and returning passengers will be allowed to pass through after showing their tickets. Manager J. E. Richards timed this gate one day recently, and a five-car train was loaded in exactly four and one-half minutes. This was accomplished without any crowding and in absolute safety to the passengers. In this way every passenger has a good chance to obtain a seat for the trains will not be overcrowded. Only a sufficient number of passengers to fill the waiting trains will be allowed through the entrance gates at one time.

TWO SHELTERS
On the south side of the enclosure a large concrete platform, 400 by 20 feet, has been constructed, and two large shelters, each 70 feet in length, with ample seating capacity, have been provided for the convenience of waiting passengers. That portion of the property between the track and the lake has also been improved. The top earth from the gravel pit between St. Thomas and Port Stanley has been used to fill in this section of the beach. It is the intention of the commission to plant this with grass seed, and a few shrubs and trees will also be set out. For years the need of some greenery near the water has been recognized, and this little plot will be much appreciated.

Vice-chairman Pocock, of the commission, suggested that the roadway along the beach should have a concrete sidewalk on either side, and then additional refreshment booths be erected. "There are not enough refreshment and amusement places at Port now," said Mr. Pocock. "By making this change the number could be considerably increased. The visitors would welcome this, I am sure."

IN THE VILLAGE.
Other improvements planned for Port Stanley are in connection with the town station. A concrete foundation will be constructed under the present building, and the interior will be re-modelled. Lavatories will be installed. In addition to this additional tracks will be constructed across Bridge street. An order of the Dominion Railway Board recently issued will permit three tracks across this street. Work on this will be commenced shortly, it is expected. This additional track accommodation, together with the double track system through the St. Thomas yards, will enable the commission to handle all its freight and passenger business with increased efficiency. Coal can be hauled from Port and left on storage tracks at St. Thomas for convenient handling later to destination. All delays which were formerly caused in St. Thomas because of the lack of double track are completely eliminated. This will greatly facilitate the handling of excursion trains between London and Port Stanley.

The commission is well pleased with the improvements that have just been completed this year. But the work will not be allowed to stop. It is the aim of the commissioners, according to Mr. Pocock, to have the entire line from St. Thomas to Port Stanley double-tracked within the next few years. This will not all be done at once, it will be completed in small sections, and the expense will not be felt in this way.

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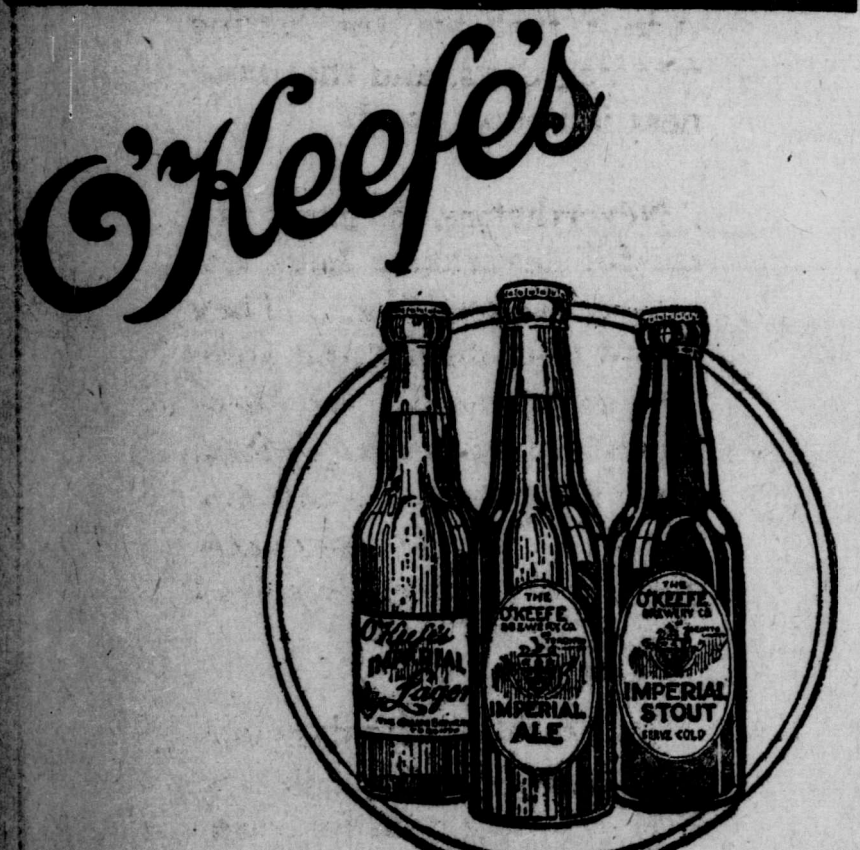
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
