## METAL FILLINGS IN TEETH, The Use of Different Materials Doe

Not Cause Electrolysis. Among dentists there is a difference of opinion as to whether the filling of two cavities in one tooth with different metals-one with mercury amalgam,

one with gold, for instance-will cause rapid decay of the tooth through elec-trolytic action between the two metals, The matter was submitted to the editor of the Electrical Review, who replies that if the amalgam is thorough-ly mixed there is no danger of electrolysis, but that if the mercury be not properly incorporated in the mass chemical action is quite likely to follow. He says that he and a dentist experimented with voltaic piles made of gold and amalgam, with blotters with sodium chloride and later wet with acetic acid, and when the amalgam had been properly mixed they were unable to measure any electrolytic action.

When decay does follow in such cases, he says, it is due not to electrolytic but to chemical action. This causes disintegration of the filling, and, of course, as soon as this has begun the acids of the mouth and the juices of the food can penetrate to the unprotected surface of the cavity and start further decay. And this takes place irrespective of whether or not gold has been used near by.
