In the month of December, your Comnittee took advantage of Dr. Gillan being in town, to request bim to preach a sermon in behalf of your Association. This he kindly consented to $\mathrm{do}_{\mathrm{z}}$, and $\mathrm{w}_{1}$ the evening of the minter fast-day, preached to a very large audicnce.
The number of subscribers during the year has been 237. These have raried in times of payment, as well as in amount of subscription, from the regular contribution of a penny a wieck to the anaual donation of $£ 2$. It will be seen from the treasurer's statement, that uprards of $£ 64$, have thus been collected in aillof the Schemes of the Church by this Association. Nor has this been at theerpeuse of this regular collections. These, we are happy 10 be able to state, have actually increased to the amount of upwards of $\mathfrak{E 2 0}$ over the previous year. We are hus enabled to quiet the apprehensions of those who thought our $\Delta$ ssociation would lessen the regular offerings at the chured-ioors, and that what was given by the one hand would be withheld by the other. At our commencement, we calculated on an jucrease in these collections, and the result bas so far gratitied us.

In whatever regards the interests of the Redecmer's kingdom, we are persuaded that to know is to feel, and to feel is to give in proportion to the demands of the Churchto the necessitics of perishing souls-to the claims of a Saviour's love. Never was there a time so big with hope and encouragement to the people of God as the presedt. There is not a country on the face of the globe the Gospel faster than they cau be supplied with Europern teachers, or eren with print* ed books. Africa, too, has caught the spark ; and from the south and west, a band of devoted men are steadily pressing onvard through that dark contiment with the light of the Cospel, so that soon we may expect to sec "Ethiopia stretching out her hands to God." Nor does the state of Europe seem dark and discouraging. We have the first fruits of the par already. In 'furkey the Gospel is free. Missionaries may now labour throughout its length and breadth, none making them afraid. The Bible is extensively circulated on the Continent, one socicty alone having distributed upw. rds of half-a-million copies during the hasi twelvo months. Protestant preachers and Piotestant churches are met with even in Italy itself. Nor do the charches seem firgetful of the wants of the masses at home. Thero are City Missions. Inagged Schools, Scripture lieaders' Associations, \&e Our own Church has her Educational Scheme, her Home Mission, and her last, if not her brightest and best, her Endorinent Scbemc. All these indicato enercy, offort, progress. They point to an approaching crisis, and to a coming glory. They tell that "the time to favour Zion has come; yca, the set-time, for the saints take pleasure in her stoucs, and her very dust is dear to them."
