The Budget-Mr. Blackmore

Mr. Philpott: Surely my hon. friend knows that the Turks and the Mongols were the bitterest enemies down through history. No two peoples ever fought each other like the Turks and the Mongols.

Mr. Blackmore: I have never said for a minute that it is the Turks. I have said it is the Turko-Mongols, and in fact the very words in the resolution show that there is a people having Turkic affinities and Mongol affinities, a red people. Who these red people are, how they come to have Turkic affinities, how they come to have Mongol affinities, can be shown before a royal commission if we have a chance.

Mr. Ellis: Tell us now.

Mr. Blackmore: Now, the suggestion couched in those words differs fantastically from what Canadians have been led to believe, differs so fantastically that hundreds of thousands of Canadians will condemn my suggestion without even stopping to listen or even think—there is evidence of that right in the house—much less to study and ponder. The great problem then is: Where shall we turn for authorities? Whom shall we believe? May we reason upon this matter briefly?

Lenin said:

We must be ready to employ trickery, deceit, law-breaking, withholding and concealing truth.

This quotation is taken from Lenin's "The Infantile Disease of Leftism". The translation is found in Sir Norman Angell's "The Steep Places", published by Harper in 1948, at page 73. I am quoting from "China in Stalin's Grand Strategy", page 13 of the pamphlet published from the article in Foreign Affairs. That would pretty well tie it down, I think. In the light of that statement of Lenin, I ask every Canadian: Can you possibly believe any account coming from any communist or communist controlled or influenced medium of information? Certainly no Canadian safely can, and no patriotic Canadian will.

As recently as 1952 the story has been told and flawlessly proven, an utterly dreadful and amazing story, step by step and person by person, of how the American communist organization took over America's most influential information media, the radio, movies, magazines and books, and through them persuaded United States leaders to support the communist plan to turn over China, Formosa and Korea to the Soviets of Russia. That sounds almost impossible to believe, but I hold in my hand a book, "While You Slept" by John T. Flynn, and I invite any member of the house or any person in the country to read that book through carefully page by

page right to the end and then question its authenticity. It establishes beyond question the truth of what I have just said.

Obviously the tremendous fact established in "While You Slept" is that communist organization agents or dupes in the United States were able to use the radio, movies, magazines and books to establish in American minds any idea or prejudice they chose to establish. This, as everyone must recognize, is an utterly appalling fact; and when you remember that it applies also to Canada it is for us even a more appalling fact. This book most clearly warns us what we must not believe.

Bearing all this in mind, let us turn again to seek for authorities. Located in the Empire State building, New York, is an organization called the national economic council. This council is a non-profit, non-partisan, membership corporation organized in 1930 under New York state law. Twice a month the economic council issues what it calls the "Economic Council Letter". These letters are generally accepted as being highly reliable.

Council letter No. 332, dated April 1, 1954, which I hold in my hand, tells us definitely the following facts:

1. The Soviet government is nothing else than a gang of plotters that succeeded in making itself master of Petrograd in 1917. I quote briefly from the publication:

The U.S.S.R. is not a world power in the sense we have always thought—a government naturally looking out for its own interests but maintaining certain general standards of honour and integrity in international dealings. Rather, this Soviet government is nothing else than a gang of plotters who succeeded in the confused days of 1917 in making itself master of Petrograd . . . and extending that mastery to all Russia.

2. This gang of plotters, with the astounding help of the United States, has made itself master of most of the Eurasian continent and threatens so to spread until it will subjugate the whole world. Here is a brief quotation:

There is not a country in the world, including the United States, that is not threatened with subjugation.

I call on the people of this nation to contemplate with the greatest of soberness that statement coming from such a source.

3. This gang of plotters down to and through their successors today have said consistently that they will not stop until they have subjugated the whole world. May I quote briefly from the publication again?

They have said that communism and capitalism cannot live side by side on the same planet.

What does that mean? That means that Canada must come under them; it can have no other meaning at all.
