## SHIPPING

REQUEST FOR STATEMENT ON RECENT COLLISION

On the orders of the day:

Mr. Frank Howard (Skeena): Mr. Speaker. I wonder could I direct a question to the Minister of Transport and ask whether he would have anything to relate to the House about the collision between the U.S. ship Cedarville and the Norwegian ship Topoalsfjiord which occurred just a few days ago, and the deaths which resulted therefrom?

Hon. J. W. Pickersgill (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I had not thought of communicating anything to the House about this, but if there were anything the hon. gentleman was particularly interested in I would be glad to make inquiries.

Mr. Howard: Periodically over the last few days I have asked the Minister questions about safety precautions and safety factors relating to collisions between ships along the Seaway and on the Great Lakes, and this is one of those matters. When the Minister said he did not feel it worth while to bring this to the attention of the House, it is a sad reflection on his own interest in safety on ships travelling on the Seaway.

Mr. Pickersgill: Mr. Speaker, I did not say it was not worth while. I said I had not thought of communicating anything to the House about this matter. The Department takes these matters very seriously and investigates them on the spot, where some good might be done.

EXEMPTION OF IRRIGATION DISTRICTS FROM SALES TAX ON MATERIALS
