TIME MINISTER'S SALARY WENT UP

Christian Guardian Wonders Whether Any Rural Methodist Preachers Get Over One Thousand a Year.

In its latest issue The Christian Guardian gives some very interesting figures regarding the average income accruing to the owner of a 100-acre farm in Ontario, and the comparatively salaries paid to preachers in same districts. The figures are the result of the investigation of a committee appointed to take a dairy census of a certain township in western Ontario. The following is from The "What is the average income of a

100-acre dairy farm in Ontario? Messrs. A. E. Gracey and T. F. Boyes of the Western Ontario Dairy Institution staff, have lately been engaged in taking a dairy census of the Yown-ship of Dorchester in Middlesex County; and they have some interesting figures in regard to this matter. In this township the two main sources of farm income have been milk and hogs, and it is estimated that the average receipts among the better class of farms would run about \$1000 from milk and \$500 from hogs. Individual farmers have done a good deal better than this, but the average would fall, perhaps, a little below the figures given. Most of this income would be secured wholly from the farm itself, with the exception, possibly, of a ton or so of shorts purchased for feed. Even these figures do not show farming to be very profitable if we take into account the value of the capital invested, with land worth about \$100 an acre. Of course, there are also other items of income, such as poultry and eggs, horses, beef, fruit and garden produce, which all have a very definite market value. And then, of course, the farmer lives rent free. Evidently the Ontario farmer who owns 100 acres of good land is not by any means a poor man.
