TO BE PROLONGED**Thaw's Lawyers Will Appeal  
Governor Felker's Decision  
if Adverse.**SHERIFF'S MISTAKE**Went to Colebrook Direct and  
Thereby Made Jerome  
Angry.COLEBROOK, N. H., Sept. 12.—  
(Can. Press.)—The protracted court  
battle denied Harry K. Thaw in Can-  
ada by a deportation order on Wed-  
nesday, promising to be waged in the  
state of New Hampshire. His newly  
retained counsel hope to have a per-  
sonal hearing before Gov. Felker on the  
matter of extradition and should ex-  
tradition be granted, to carry the mat-  
ter to the state supreme court on a  
writ of habeas corpus. Three of these  
attorneys, N. E. Martin of Concord,  
W. H. Olmstead of New York and  
W. H. Shurtliff of Colebrook, hurried  
to the capital today.Sheriff Hornbeck of Dutchess county,  
N. Y., wherein is located the Mattea-  
son asylum from which Thaw made  
his sensational escape nearly a month  
ago, was en route here tonight with  
a requisition warrant signed by  
Judge Governor Felker. Upon his ar-  
rival, he, or some other representa-  
tive of the state, will be turned back to  
Concord. Why Hornbeck started for  
this place was a mystery to Wm. Tra-  
vers Jerome, who has been for three  
weeks trying to get Thaw back to the  
asylum.Three Days' Truce.  
Thaw's lawyers, next according to  
their hearing before Governor Felker.  
They estimate that three days will  
elapse before he can render a decision.  
If this is adverse, they will apply at  
once for a writ of habeas corpus. Ar-  
gument on this would likely be post-  
poned for another week.  
This would mean days of weary  
waiting unless Jerome could engineer  
some coup. He has in mind now a  
plan instantly to seize the fugitive in  
case his deportation is ordered,  
thus blocking efficiency of the  
asylum in charge. Thaw's lawyers  
are in charge. The writ would have  
to be directed against the prisoner's  
custodian at the time, and if Jerome  
could work quickly enough and with  
sufficient secrecy, a subterfuge might  
be successful.Extradition a Subterfuge.  
In view of the intention of fighting  
the case out in Concord, Thaw was not  
brought in court in Colebrook today,  
and it is probable that his hearing  
will be postponed again tomorrow,  
and on Monday he will be taken to  
Concord for trial. The chief argu-  
ment of his lawyers will be that New  
York needs his extradition on a charge  
of conspiracy, a charge which they  
claim New York never purposes to  
bring on. Thaw will contend that

LINE TAKES SHAPE**Tentative Agreement is Made  
for Hamilton-St. Catharines  
C. P. R. Extension.ST. CATHARINES, Sept. 12.—(Spe-  
cial.)—A conference between the St.  
Catharines City Council and Norman  
M. Todd for the C.P.R. this after-  
noon resulted in terms being tentat-  
ively agreed upon for the beginning  
of the construction of the proposed  
fast electric line between Hamilton  
and St. Catharines by the C.P.R., six  
months after a bylaw is passed by the  
ratepayers of this city granting  
\$100,000 towards the cost of bridging  
the big gully of the old Welland Canal  
at the entrance to St. Catharines. The  
company is expected to grant a two-  
cent passenger rate, give a service  
of four trains each way between the  
two cities and touch all intervening  
towns and villages in the fruit belt.  
The terms will go to the head office  
of the company at Montreal for ratifi-  
cation and if acceptance a bylaw will  
be submitted as soon as possible.The company is very emphatic in  
announcing that this line will not be  
extended as far east as the Niagara  
River, but may later be extended to  
the neighboring towns of Merillon  
and Thorold. A limit of two years  
is placed upon the time for the be-
