BONUS TO IRON INDUSTRY URGED WOULD DEVELOP LAKE SUPERIOR REGION AND STIMULATE TRADE

R. R. Gamey Traces Evolution of Iron Mining in Ontario—Price Grays, But Production Has Not Increased—Surveys Show Promising Tracts in Northern Ontario.

The Ontario Legislature yesterday put itself on record as in favor of urging upon the federal government the importance of granting a measure that would stimulate the iron industry of Canada. What form that assistance would take would be left to the discretion of the ministers at Ottawa, but the idea would be to promote public interest that the iron and steel business, which now languishes, would be placed on an assured and permanent footing.

The lines of argument advanced by the various speakers united in proving that although the nucleus of a great industry had been discovered already, the attempts to exploit it had been very feeble. Ministers and members alike recognized that Canada enjoyed the opportunity of becoming a recognized producer of iron and steel products, and expressed the conviction that with encouragement from the federal authorities a new impetus would be given to commercial activities.

The chief benefit which Ontario would derive would consist in the linking up of east and west by the influx of settlers to the Lake Superior region. Here the region bore all the indications of a limitless supply of valuable ore.

Mine Development Slow. In speaking to the motion on the iron industry Mr. Gamey traced the evolution of mining in the province from thirty years ago when the price was \$10 per ton of ore, to the present when the import was huge and the price had risen accordingly. In 1912 Canada was using over a million tons of pig iron, and of this amount only 25,000 tons had come from Canadian mines.

Gamey Suggests Bonus. He claimed that the northern parts of the province contained ore quite as promising as that of Michigan, and the American Superior mines, but that the splendid equipment and good staff of the Americans had discouraged

EDITORS WOULD FILL PRISONS OF CANADA

Proposal to Make Publication of Criminals' Pictures Serious Offence Moved Halifax Senator to Fervid Speech—Choquette Says Booksellers Support Bill.

OTTAWA, March 12.—A lively attack was made today in the senate upon Senator Choquette's bill for forbidding the publication of the pictures of persons accused of crime or their accomplices, with the penalty of two years in prison for such publication.

Senator Dennis of Halifax said he understood this bill proposed to make a crime in Canada of what has heretofore been a perfectly legitimate, harmless matter of daily business, and to cover with odium the twelve hundred newspapers, dealers and booksellers for the manner in which they have conducted their business in the past.

PROMINENT ODDFELLOW IS STRICKEN ON STREET

Thomas Thomson, Well Known in Riverdale, Died Suddenly Yesterday. While walking west on Carlton street about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon Thomas Thomson, 115 Woodbine avenue, collapsed on the sidewalk, and when picked up by a constable was dead. A physician was called, who gave heart failure as the cause of death. The body was removed to the morgue, but an inquest is unlikely.

INFERIOR CLASS OF IMMIGRANTS FLOCKING IN

Opposition at Ottawa Charged That Desirable Type From United States Were Discouraged—Roche Made Effective Answer to Criticisms of Inspection.

OTTAWA, March 12.—There are two stock subjects for academic debate in the house of commons; one is dismissals and the other immigration. It was the latter question which the Liberal members debated at great length today. Hon. Dr. Roche's estimates for the immigration department afforded the opportunity for the discussion.

Edward Beck Hints at Coming Startling Revelations—Detective Bidding of Burns Agency, Says Corporation "Approached" More Than One Alderman.

MONTREAL, March 12.—Edward Beck, former editor of The Montreal Herald, who conducted an investigation which resulted in proof that three members of the Quebec Legislature had accepted graft, is back home from a holiday in Bermuda, and in an interview tonight says: "My experience in Quebec showed me that exposure of graft among public officials is neither a profitable nor pleasurable duty. If, however, Mr. Louis McGibbon, whose public interest inspired this investigation, desires me to make public the result of my enquiry at the Montreal City Hall, I will do so. We have evidence that more than one city official was on the Burns operatives pay roll during the time they were engaged in Montreal."

AGREE ON PLAN OF CARVING N.B. Redistribution of Eleven Seats Causes Little Friction—P. E. I. Hopes to Retain Seats.

OTTAWA, March 12.—The distribution of New Brunswick constituencies over which the Liberals and Conservatives from the province have been in consultation, will be submitted to the special committee tomorrow. There is general agreement with the plan and unless the committee decides to make some changes the eleven seats in New Brunswick will be as follows: St. John and Albert (2 members), Madawaska and Restigouche, Victoria and Carleton, Sunbury and York, Queens and Kings, Charlotte, Westmoreland, Kent, Northumberland and Gloucester.

WILL IMPROVE GRADES OF I.C.R. Survey of Line From Montreal to Halifax to Result in Various Betterments.

OTTAWA, March 12.—A survey of the Intercolonial Railway from Montreal to Halifax and Sydney, with the view of eliminating the present heavy grades, replacing light bridges with heavier steel structures, and estimating the cost of a cut-off at Truro, has been ordered.

Agreement Understood to Have Been Reached at Conference Last Night—Sum of Forty to Fifty Millions is Apparently Required.

OTTAWA, March 12.—The World understands that an agreement was reached tonight between the government and the Canadian Northern Railway whereby the government will guarantee the bonds of the railway. Sir William Mackenzie had a conference late tonight with Premier Borden and Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, and came to terms regarding this important question, which has been pending for some time. The agreement of course will be submitted to parliament.
