and with about the same population (the cases are taken for this reason), sent to the United States, according to the statement of the American consul at Basle, in 1873, at point of shipment, watches valued at $\$ 2,520,104$. To pay for these it would have taken in Illinois say $5,000,000$ bushels of corn. In the same year Switzerlund sent embroidery to the amount of $\$ 2,095,234$; another call for $4,000,000$ bushels of Illinois corn. Again in the same year and from the same country, we imported silk and silk goods to the value of $\$ 5,224,116$, a call for $10,000,000$ more bushels of Illinois corn; making in round numbers $19,000,000$ bushels which would have been necessary had the payment been made in corn, for three kinds only of manufactures requiring skilled artistic work. This astonishing feat she could not have accomplished with rude manufactures. Trangportation alone would have prevented it.
Let us see what Alabama's settlement of this item would amount to in her favorite staple. The above amount ( $(\$ 9,839,454$ ) was not in currency, but in gold, and would have required in cotton, say at Montgomery, in round numbers $79,000,000$ pounds, or 178,000 bales. The basis of this estimate is made upon these data : The average price of cotton from September, 1873 to April, 1874, was 14 cts. in currency; average promium on gold for the same period $11 \frac{1}{2}$ cts.-From "Home and School."
