Let him understand that industry is above knowledge and that he cannot hope to succeed unless he makes up his mind to work, and above all to keep steady. With a little knowledge, and a good deal of industry and determination, a man need not fail to make a good living in the Company's Territory, and in a few years to attain to a competence, and in many instances a position that he could not hope for in England.
