BECAPITULATION.

FROM the preceding observations, it is rendered quite evident that there is a natural relation throughout all orders of Natural Beings-that inferior orders are subject to certain laws-that these laws are modified by other laws as we rise in the scale of beings-that the perfection of beings depends wholly upon an additional organization-that the cause of the manifestations of the Mind, must, unavoidably, be ascribed to organization; and consequently the Organs, which constitute the Mind, are as numerous as the manifestations-that the Brain is exclusively the Organ of the Propensities.
