When the last of the centres is completed, and local committees have been appointed, a suggested programme will be issued. This programme will include pageants, in which the school-children will take the leading part, and speeches by prominent men. In some centres there will be sports, either field or aquatic, fire-works displays and other features of a local character.

Each centre will include not only the city in which the celebration is held, but neighbouring towns, villages, and municipalities, covering a considerable area. It is intended that excursions shall be run and holidays granted.

It is proposed that there shall be a Canadian speaker at the principal American centres and an American speaker a* the principal Canadian centres.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON JANUARY 8, 1914.

International Celebration on Niagara Frontier. That in view of the advantages offered by Niagara Falls for purposes of celebration, as well as of its special associations with the War of 1812, a proposal be submitted to the American Committee to hold the final gathering of the celebration at this point.

Bridges, Tunnels, &c. That the question of erection of Bridges and other large memorials be referred to the Canadian members of the Joint International Committee for report.

Medals. That the President be empowered to procure designs for appropriate medals in commemoration of the Hundred Years of Peace.

Life-Saving Apparatus below Niagara Falls. That in view of the loss of life which has constantly occurred on the Niagara River, this Committee would recommend to the favourable consideration of the Government or Governments concerned any practical suggestions for the placing of life-saving apparatus on the banks or across the Niagara River, as a memorial to the Hundred Years of Peace.
