UP IN NORTH TORONTOVote Polling Will Be Heaviest Ever
—Annexation Likely to Carry
—Suburban Doings.

NORTH TORONTO, Jan. 1.—(Special.)—At the last moment and too late to counteract, even if considered worthy, in the ordinary way, Mr. Murphy, one of the candidates for the mayoralty office, has issued a circular reflecting generally on the course adopted by the mayor, and dealing vaguely with charges of collusion on the part of the chief magistrate.

On Friday Mr. Murphy was the author of a circular appealing for support, and stating among other things that the relations existing between himself and the mayor were friendly, his latest production launched on Saturday night, and which is nothing more or less than the common, ordinary norbach, charges his worthiness with lining up with the Howe-Reid-Ball et al company, and with, in short, being recreant to every promise and trust reposed in him. The mayor is especially scored for his attitude on the sewerage question, and generally with allying himself with the large property owners of the town as against the small.

Charges Unfair.

The charges leveled against Mayor Brown by Mr. Murphy are so void of reason as really not to merit any consideration. No man who ever occupied the mayoralty chair in the Town of North Toronto has kept himself more scrupulously aloof from all alliances than A. J. Brown. He has been approached with a view to this end, but has steadily refused and stands to-day absolutely untrammelled. One thing he has never done is to deliberately in the face of public opinion, and the openly expressed wish of the ratepayers, throw down a by-law when once considered by the electorate.

The action of Mr. Murphy introduces a new phase of municipal code of honor in North Toronto, and one to which the right thinking citizens of the town will never subscribe. Statements and innuendoes handed out at the last moment, and these absolutely false and misleading, will not adversely affect A. J. Brown's candidature. The World has from time to time criticized some of the mayor's actions on some points. This eleventh hour underhand attack is not such an honorable rival would inaugurate. Mayor Brown need have no fear of it.

Good Men All.

Of the electors of the council, the ratepayers have seldom, if ever, been more highly favored in the character and stamp of men offering for municipal honors and responsibilities.

In Walter Muston the electors have a man of probity, of good business ability, and an indefatigable worker in committee and council alike, he is a sound adviser, and his judgment has never been called in question. His return is practically assured.

Fred Howe has from time to time aroused some opposition in council, but in an active and aggressive man, this is inevitable. He is a hard worker, all hard blows given and received, is one of the best-liked men in town. His presence on the council board is indispensable, and in dealing with the Metropolitan Railway question alone, Frank Howe has abundantly vindicated his strength. North Toronto needs and especially during the incoming year, aggressive men.

D. D. Reid has during his term of office given evidence of the good work in store for the incoming year. He has a general interest in the welfare of North Toronto and anything that can be done to promote its growth and prosperity will always find ready support in D. D. Reid. His return is generally admitted to be a foregone conclusion.

Some New Men.

John P. Patterson is a new aspirant for municipal honors, but it is safe to say that few men have ever come more rapidly to the front. His clear-cut statement of Saturday with respect to his business relations has immensely strengthened his position, and it seems to be morally certain that he will win a seat at the next council board.

R. B. McQueen is a man who ought to receive the hearty endorsement of the ratepayers of the town. Mr. McQueen has acquitted himself well in any position of trust he has ever occupied, and that he will, if elected, make a first-class councillor is generally conceded. Give Mr. McQueen a friendly boost.

Around town the impression is decidedly favorable to the candidature of Charles De Ferrari, and in view of his many personal friends, and well known business ability it is now freely admitted that Mr. De Ferrari will poll a very large vote. The man who has made a success of his own business is pretty certain to do well for the town.

In all the local churches to-day there were large congregations, the services being for the most part of a nature in keeping with the season.

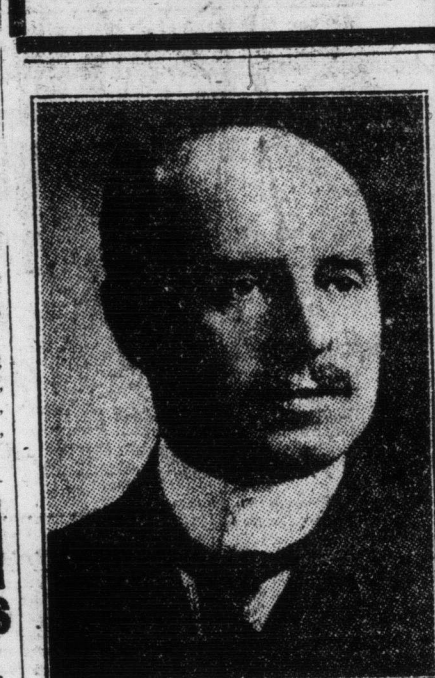
A BIG UNDERTAKING.
CHICAGO, Jan. 1.—The Chicago Subway, Arcade and Traction Co. is said, will ask the council to commit local transportation at the next meeting to the most sweeping ordinance ever granted by any city. The company, according to the board of education, stands prepared to reveal its New York financial backers to the council, and will ask for a franchise to construct a complete system of passenger and freight subways, a complete outer harbor, or western system of docks and warehouses, and to carry out immediately the Chicago plan scheme.

It was estimated that more than \$100,000,000 will be required.

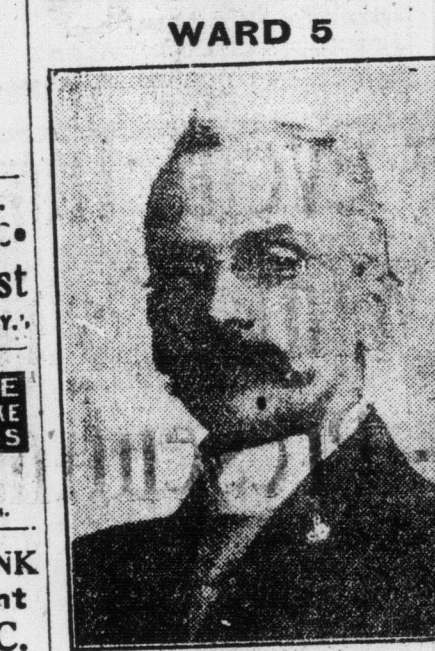
MILLIONS FOR ITS OWN PET HOBBIES, BUT NOT A COPPER FOR THE VIADUCT.

EXPLOSION IN A TUNNEL.
NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—An explosion of dynamite in a tunnel 100 feet below the surface in the plant of the Astoria Heat and Power Company at Casino Beach, L.I., yesterday morning resulted in the death of Ernest Strickland, 238, and the probable death of William Jackson of Jersey City, who had his eyes blown out. Eighteen other workmen were painfully injured, 33 having been sent to hospital, eyes and being cut by flying rock.

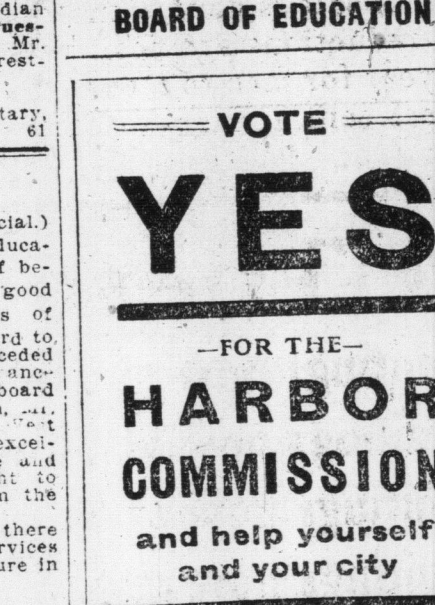
CHURCH DAMAGED BY FIRE.

circumstances. With the details of the charges, Mr. Hodgson said he was unfamiliar. He had not seen the warrant, but understood it referred to a transaction involving \$50,000, which took place in January, 1910. Mr. Hodgson was unable to say whether this alleged theft had any connection whatever with a mining transaction and subsequent loan which Mr. Travers made with certain parties at Syracuse, N.Y., concerning which testimony had been given at the trial.

Curator is Mum.
G. T. Clarkson, curator and interim liquidator of the Farmers' Bank, was not in a position to discuss the matter. "All I know," said Mr. Clarkson, "is that Mr. Travers has been arrested on a charge of theft involving \$50,000. The information was laid by the crown officers and they took the initiative."

Crown Attorney Corley declined to be interviewed, but The World is led to understand that Mr. Corley's attention was directed to the transaction by someone in the bank, as the inquiry into the accounts so far has been thorough, and directed to all transactions on the part of the officers to discover their whereabouts. The assets of the institution have been inventoried.

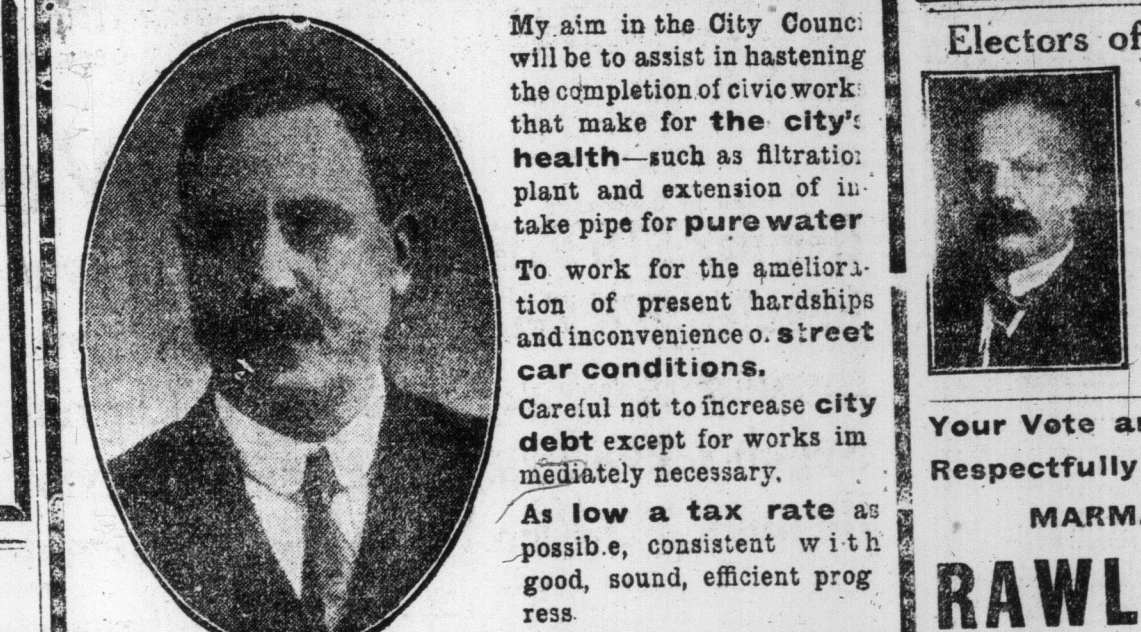

CLERICS IN POLITICS
Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Bourassa Urge Rival Views at Rome.

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—(Special.)—The presence in Rome of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux has caused no end of comment here in religious and political circles. While Mr. Bourassa will try to ascertain if the decline of French-Canadian influence at the Vatican has been caused by the fact that the Pope's advisers have been erroneously instructed regarding Canadian affairs, Mr. Lemieux will speak in the name of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and it remains to be seen if the Liberal claims of undue interference in politics on the part of the clergy will hold water.

Report has it that the Vatican authorities decided to keep Mgr. Stagni, the new delegate to Canada, close at hand till the Canadian minister arrived, and now that Mr. Lemieux has seen the Pope and his secretary of state, it is said that he will sail for Canada at all. It is quite sure that, had the bishop's way, Mgr. Stagni or no other Roman prelate would ever take up residence at Ottawa.

Service in Theatre.
Sure evidence of the many friends whom the Rev. J. D. Morrow has in Toronto was the crowded parquet and gallery of the Royal Alexandra Theatre last night, where he held his usual Sunday service, instead of at St. Andrew's Hall, from where he was crowded by the poultry show. On the stage with him were the Alexander Choir, under the direction of Mr. Palmer, and a quartet of male singers, whose singing added much to the force of the "athlete" preacher's words. Mr. Morrow, always a strong speaker, was especially convincing in his appeal, in which he bitterly condemned hypocritical tendencies of many church people of today.
