



Tokio, April 9 .- The notorious Yoshivari, the principal quarter of Toklo, inhabited by the licensed Hetairae. was destroyed by fire to-day. Many of these houses were almost palatial in appearance, and a thousand of them were burned in a little more than three hours. Six thousand female inmates

were rendered homeless.
