

ASSASSIN TOUCHED BY

Relented, Declaring He Had Children of His Own-Score of

Suspects Arrested. WHITE PLAINS, N.Y., Nov. 10

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y., Nov. 10—With nearly a score of suspects under arrest, two of whom have been identified, the authorities here believe they have in custody to-night at least four of the five men implicated in the murder of Mrs. Mary Hall in a lonely farm house near Yorktown yesterday, during an attempt to rob the place. The man believed to have wielded the knife with which Mrs. Hall was stabbed, is still at large. According to the police, one of the suspects, who they say has confessed, has given information on which they expect to bring the slayer to book shortly.

Vincenzo Carno and Philip de Marco, both Italians, are the names given by the men who have been identified as members of the robber gang. Miss Hannah Griffen, Mrs. Hall's nurse, today identified Carno as the man who held her a prisoner in the yard while the raid was made on the house. Later Mrs. John S. Rae, another of the four women who were in the house, picked out De Marco from a line of eight prisoners, as another of the assailants. She declared that she had thrown her jewelry to De Marco and got down on her knees to beg him to spare her and her children. He relented, she said, declaring he had children of his own.

The third degree, say the police, brought a confession from Carno, in which he implicated three of the men under arrest and revealed the name of the actual murderer. Carno declared the raid was planned to steal \$3000 of insurance money the men had heard was in the house.

What is regarded as a promising clue was word from New York received tonight that four more men had been arrested there on suspicion of being implicated in the crime. These men admitted they had come from the neighborhood of Yorktown to-day. On two of the men were found tickets for Italy. Officers will go to New York to investigate the evidence against the four men.

He believes that a man in an aeroplane could do more accurate and extensive survey work in the forests of the Pacific slope country in a few hours when forest fires are raging than is usually accomplished by twenty rangers in a week. With wireless stations installed on peaks in the chief danger zones he believes it would be a comparatively easy task to assemble men and apparatus to check and extinguish the flames and prevent spreading.—Popular Mechanics.
