

## FELLOWS ARE ASKED TO LEAVE TO SPEND WINTER

Controllers Also Decide to Institute Action Against Contractors—Censor Board Appointed.

The board of control yesterday decided to ask Engineer Fellows to tender their resignation; failing this, he is to be dismissed forthwith. Criminal action will also be taken against the contractors.

Mayor Hocken was particularly anxious that there be no discussion, taking the report as full authority for the action taken by the board. He did not want the names of Commissioner Harris dragged into the question, as it was distinctly understood that the board of control was dealing with the engineers' actions before he came under the control of the works commissioner. Mr. Harris states that the engineer is performing his present duties satisfactorily.

The board of control decided in favor of the appointment of a censorship commission consisting of three members. The chairman to be paid a salary of \$1200 per year to give him whole time, and two assistants to give half their time, and be paid \$600 per year for their services.

The chairman's chief duties will be to supervise the advertising and poster work generally and be responsible for the work of the censorship.

The controllers are unanimously of the opinion that the present system is totally undesirable, but would rather leave it to the board to make the appointments, subject to their recommendations as to the number which will compose the censor commission, and the reporting of funds.

## Accused of Burning His Brother's Barn

Kingsley Rand, Burford Township Farmer, Alleged to Have Caused Serious Loss.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Dec. 18.—(Special.)—Kingsley Rand, a Burford Township farmer, was arrested today by High Constable Kerr charged with the entire season's crops and seven head of cattle, were a total loss yesterday following a fire at which determined efforts were made by the neighbors to extinguish the flames.

The prisoner is said to be mentally unbalanced, and his motive was an alleged grievance against his brother. He was remanded in court today.

**DENIES THE REPORT.**

Appointment to Faculty Had Nothing to Do With Dr. Eakin's Resignation.

When interviewed by The World last night Professor Thomas Eakin of Toronto University said that there was not the slightest truth in the statement in an evening paper that the appointment of Dr. J. B. Eakin to the university faculty was partly responsible for his resignation.

"My intention is to go into law," said Dr. Eakin, "and there is absolutely no connection between my resignation and the appointment of Dr. B. Eakin."

Dr. B. Eakin, who will be associate professor in Semitic languages, was called on to resign by the university, and the far east. He is also an author of a book on "The Bible and Archaeology."

Fifty Thousand Prosperous Westerners Will Also Spend Money Here—Take Many Enthusiasts Back.

At least fifty thousand wheat growers of Western Canada come east to spend their winters in the Province of Ontario. This was the estimate given The World yesterday afternoon by the passenger departments of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Grand Trunk Railway.

It was stated that this number of men, principally those who left Ontario for the west and wish to spend the winter with their relatives and friends, come from the west to this province before Christmas and stay here until about the first of March, when they return to the west to ride more wheat.

"It is worthy of note," said one of the leading passenger officials of the Grand Trunk to The World, "that a good proportion of these men take back west with them their families, and in many cases friends whom they had to go west with them. This is shown when these men come to the passenger department with the return half of their ticket and ask for several more tickets to the same destination."

"When it is taken into consideration that these men bring back to spend during their stay in Ontario from one hundred dollars up, it will be readily seen that the fact alone of these men, spending their winters here means a million dollars or more annually to this province. It also means that the number of new men leaving this province in the spring is greatly increased by the stories of success told by the westerners who spend their winters here."

**MANITOULIN'S HOPE REALIZED**

Railway to Island Now Ready for Government Inspection, and Will Be Running Shortly.

Within a very few days the new Manitoulin-Sudbury line of the East Algoma Railway will be opened and R. R. Gagey will be a happy man. Hon. A. J. Matheson, provincial treasurer, informed The World yesterday that the road had just been inspected and that Engineer Halford of the department of public works is now busy inspecting it. After Engineer Halford's inspection will come the Dominion's inspection and then the formal opening of the line.

Until the present the only connection Manitoulin Island has had with the mainland has been by water. The Channel by way of Cloche Island and enters Manitoulin Island at Little Current, where a drawbridge, 150 feet long, has been constructed. This remarkable bridge will allow the biggest lake boats to pass through the channel.

The road from Sudbury to Little Current is 33 miles long and has been under construction for more than two years. The Lake Superior Corporation built the road, but the Ontario Government subsidized the southern end, 33 miles at \$5000 a mile. The cost of the road to the province is \$265,000. The population of Manitoulin is over 20,000. Transportation has been the island's knottiest problem and the success of the new road is due in a large measure to the work of R. R. Gagey. The scenery on the route of the new railway is said to be magnificent.

**BONAR LAW TO QUIT?**

Opposition to Tariff Reform Too Great to Be Resisted.

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—(Can. Press.)—A London special cable to The World today says:

"From a party standpoint there is now no question whatever that Mr. Bonar Law made a disastrous mistake in his proposal, made at a meeting at Ashton-under-Lyne, under the presidency of Sir Max Aitken, to shift the odium of imposing taxes on food of the people of the United Kingdom from the shoulders of his own party to those of the overseas Dominions."

Today there is a chorus of dissent from the Conservative press, and there is a growing opinion that Mr. Bonar Law's leadership of the Unionist party is fast drawing to a close, as there is a powerful and rapidly-increasing section of the Unionists who are determined to shake themselves free of the cause of tariff reform."

**NEW MISSION PROJECT.**

World-wide Movement to Be Started at New York.

New and gigantic plans for a world-wide mission campaign are proposed by the international secretary, J. Campbell White.

An emergency meeting of the Canadian council was held yesterday to consider the project.

Today the plans will be considered at a special meeting in New York. Toronto will be represented by Rev. Canon Gould, Herbert K. Caskey, H. J. Gundy and W. G. Senior.

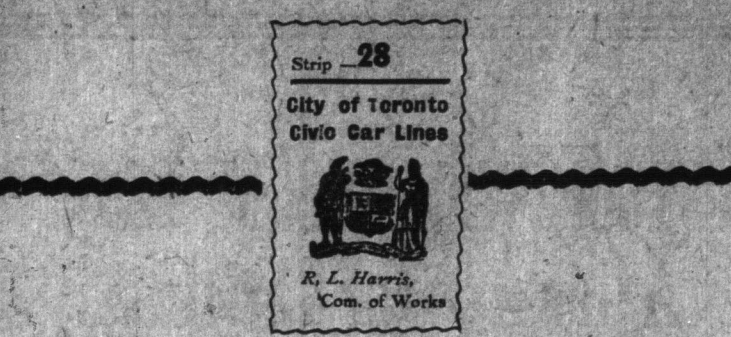
They will report to the Canadian council next Monday.

**RUSSIA WANTS WORLD PEACE**

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 18.—(Can. Press.)—A desire for the preservation of European peace, combined with the determination to defend with the nation's whole strength Russia's vital interests, was the keynote of a speech on Balkan affairs made by Premier Kokovsov in the duma today.

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"The Russian Government is glad it has not to ground for suspecting Russia of selfish designs or of a desire to aggravate conflicts. The fundamental principles which will guide the Russian Government when the hour for final decisions has sounded are indicated by our past."

"Faithful to her alliance with France and to her friendly relations with other great powers and sure of the latter's support, she sees no use in setting up one group of powers against another."

The Russian Government hopes that the united efforts by which the powers are inspired will help them to arrive at an agreement which will reconcile the interests with the just demands of the Balkan States.
