

WHOLESALE FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

Business was fairly brisk on the wholesale Saturday, with prices keeping practically stationary on the bulk of the offerings.

H. J. Ash had a car of potatoes selling at \$2.50 per bag; Emperor grapes at \$3 per keg; Malaga at \$12 to \$15 per keg; oranges at \$5 to \$6 per case; raisins at \$7.50 per twenty package case; Cal cauliflower at \$4.25 per case; iceberg head lettuce at \$7.50 per case; holly at \$7 per case; holly wreaths at \$2.25 per doz; apples at \$6.50 to \$8 per box; onions at \$8 per 100-lb. sack.

Poultry—The offering of poultry was large. Dressed chickens were brought forward in every part of the market. Trade was only fair at prices ranging from 28c to 35c per lb. Dressed fowl sold at 25c to 30c, and dressed ducks at 30c to 35c per lb. geese were only fair trade at 25c per lb. according to quality.

Turkeys were a light supply and prices ranged from 15c to 60c per lb. A couple of vendors tried to get 60c, but could not find purchasers at the figure. Mr. T. Brantford, had the finest bunch of turkeys seen on the market this season. He has no trouble in selling them at 60c per lb.

Fruits and vegetables—The usual supply of fruits and vegetables was brought forward in every part of the market. Trade was only fair at prices that showed but little change from those of the previous week. Apples were at \$6 to \$8 per box; oranges at \$4 to \$5 per case; grapefruit at \$4 to \$4.50 per case; Florida grapefruit selling at \$4.50 to \$5 per case; a car of Florida oranges at \$4.50 to \$5 per case; Sunset Valencia oranges at \$5 to \$6 per case; Emperor grapes at \$3 per hamper; cabbage at \$3 per hamper; Spanish onions at \$7.50 to \$8 per case.

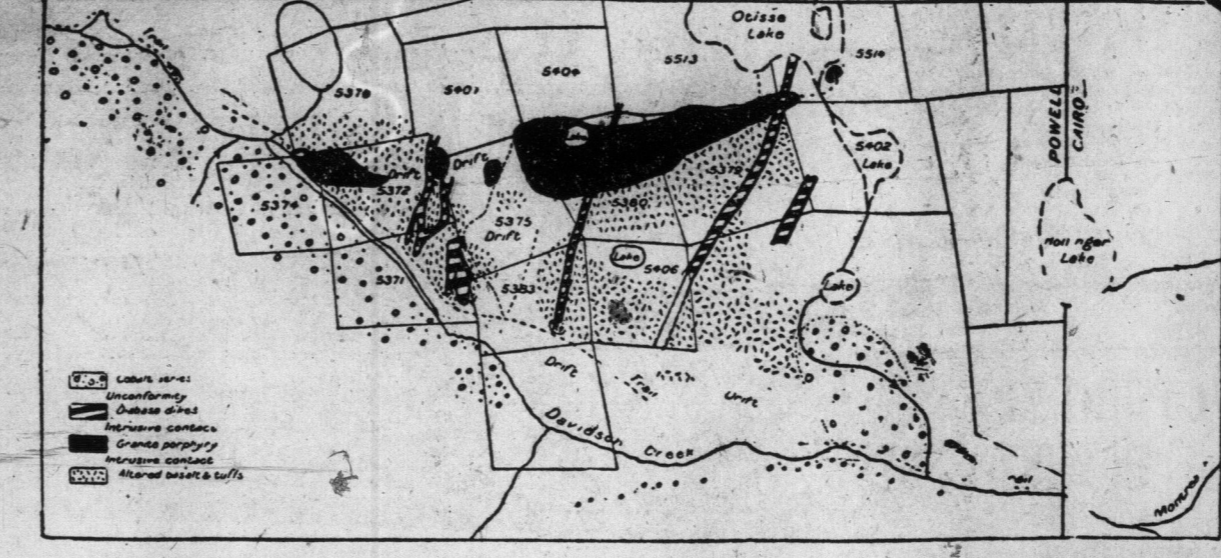
