### MEDICAL INSPECTION FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

Canada Seems to Be Away Behind the Times—People Won't Pay for It.

Medical inspection of school children was the topic before the local women's council last night in the Canadian Institute. It was discussed by Mrs. Archibald Huestis, Dr. Helen MacMurphy, Dr. Chas. J. Hastings of the university senate, Dr. Hodgett, secretary of the provincial board of health, and others. It was the unanimous opinion that Canada was behind the age in the matter, England, Scotland and the United States having adopted fifteen to twenty years ago the measures now being considered in this country. Mrs. Huestis felt that the state owed more to the child than mental education alone. Dr. MacMurphy pointed out that medical inspection was practically universal in private schools and regretted that the poor man's child should not have equal attention. Dr. Hastings held that the subject was not debatable. Japan had 800 paid medical inspectors in educational institutions, and he had come to the conclusion Canada was a long way from civilization yet. Dr. Hodgett feared that the thin end of the wedge introduced by Dr. Bryce had been a miserable failure, because the public will not pay for the service. What was advanced of education was practically applicable to rural or urban communities, and he thought a committee of numbers of the teachers and medical professions to report at an early date would be a useful step.

**Interest to All.**  
Mrs. Huestis in introducing the discussion pointed out that the inspection proposed would affect parents, school boards and other bodies, turning their attention to matters of home hygiene, and that parents generally took kindly to the plan. As to the necessity in Montreal 90 per cent. of the children were found to be diseased or subject to dangerous influences. In Toronto in diseases of the eyes and teeth alone much good was to be done. Dr. MacMurphy began with a pointed illustration taken from her experience with a wood-turner who had made a scientific instrument for her. When it was finished, perfect as she thought, he asked, is there anyway I can improve it? She was not there to find fault with their nearly perfect school system, but as a teacher with a medical career in prospect she could not help observing that medical advice would often have been of advantage to the scholars. Medical inspection was the rule in private schools, and she had no fault to find with them, simple records being made at entry.

Few knew how much was now done in the city, and she described the three registers kept since 1902 at the city hall, where is recorded every house where contagious disease has occurred and when; a similar record for schools, and another for individuals noting cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever.

**Why They Were Absent.**  
She quoted Dr. Goodchild's paper in the section of Hygiene, giving the results of reports made last March on 12,000 children. In the month of some 20 days there had been 24,000 days of absence, which she thought a large percentage. The figures varied from 308 days for skin disease to 1459 for headache and 719 for diseased eyes. Two classes she thought, should be taken together. She had noticed evidences of eye-strain in the schools of St. John's Ward. Toothache accounts for 229 1-2 days, and attending the dentist 255. That trouble and run down conditions were 1000 days each.

**Hungry, But Healthy.**  
Reverting to St. John's Ward Dr. MacMurphy said the children there should have good health, but some of them looked very hungry.

"We haven't begun our dinners yet," was Miss How's explanation a few days ago. They always looked hungrier on Monday than other days. This was because they got very little on Saturday or Sunday. The children were made to work for what they wanted at the school to make them independent.

With this digression Dr. MacMurphy suggested that September was the best time to introduce medical inspection when parents were willing to do anything to get their children placed in the schools. She dwelt on the necessity of seeing that the children's eyes, ten per cent. of the pupils in private schools being thus affected. The best indication of a child's health was its weight. There was no good taking a child ten pounds lighter and six inches shorter than it should be and forcing it mentally. A record of its weight and weight should be sent to the parents and when they found their child below the average they would take steps to see it strengthened.

**Physical Examination Stage.**  
Dr. Hastings considered the discussion a reflection on all the authorities concerned. He was sorry to think we were only talking about the thin end of the wedge. He mentioned overwork, mental strain, too prolonged attention to one subject and the ill effects of test examinations as among evils to be looked for.

Test examinations are an abomination. The teacher who is not able to decide the merit of a scholar after a whole term's observation is not fit for the position. (Applause.) Nervous children did themselves no justice in examinations, and medals and scholarships were often paid for with a large slice of the winners' lives. Prevention was the key to the matter. The ideal was a mild form of degeneracy, and the physical condition should be kept well in advance of the mental. A marked upward curve was seen on observation charts of St. Vitus' dance when the examination period approached. Hughes' efforts had not been successful in restricting examinations.

**Bad Eyesight.**  
Imperfect vision was a frequent cause of vertigo, headache and consequent loss of mind. A pair of glasses often made all the difference between a lazy vice and a strong virtue. Mr. Weir Mitchell once said, Twenty years ago the treatment of disease had been the highest medical ideal. Now the highest ideal was prevention. The ideal doctor or nurse was Nature's skilled assistant. We should redeem our reputation from the position now occupied as a back number by so perfect a revised edition. China, he thought, was hundreds of years ahead of us, since the Chinese only paid their physicians while their patients were in good health. Thoreau went was the best medical method.

**People Will Not Pay.**  
Dr. Hodgett said the board of health was not altogether to blame as the people would not pay for the service. The necessity was not, perhaps so apparent as in other countries, as there was not the same aggregation of vice and poverty and unhealthy housing. In Chicago there was a joint control by the medical department and the board of education with district or county officers like the school inspectors. In American cities it was found that parents sent their children to the medical inspector. Treatment was left to the parents, however, except in cases of poverty, which were left to the staff nurses.

Mrs. F. H. Torrington presided. Resolutions were passed in American meeting were rendered by Mrs. Cummings and Miss Hill.

**GREAT TIGER HALF-BACK GETS PROMOTION BY BOARD**  
Appointments by Internal Management Committee—Mayor Opposes T. H. & B. Application.

Hamilton, Dec. 6.—(Special.)—The internal management committee of the board of education this evening gave Ben Simpson, the great Tiger half-back, a promotion and an increase of salary from \$100 to \$110 as a science teacher. The resignations of W. A. Jennings and W. J. Loughed, collegiate institute teachers, who have been appointed to the staff of the Jarvis-street Collegiate Institute, were accepted, and Wyatt Malcolm, Kingston, at \$100 a year and J. G. Workman, Wingham, at \$100, were appointed in their places. The following appointments were also made: Misses Winnifred Denzate, Rita Freeman and Ethel Lester, teachers in the public schools; Bryan Smith, as principal of the Wentworth-street School; Miss Miles, Chicago, and Miss Chubbam, Oakville, domestic science teachers, at a salary of \$50 a year. A motion to abolish school fees was voted down on the casting vote of the chairman. A special committee was appointed to deal with the application of the lady school and kindergarten teachers for increase of salary. The board will insist upon having the quarters now occupied by the city solicitor.

**Board of Works.**  
The board of works and finance committee met this evening to consider the application of the T. H. & B. for permission to build a switch in the east end of the city. Mayor Biggar appeared for the Hamilton and Quebec Junction Railway and asked for a delay, as he said his company wanted to build a switch in the same territory, and he did not think it in the interest of the city that there should be switches where one would answer all purposes. Action was deferred.
