Sir Charles Tupper Was in Great Form and Spoke to a Crowd that Packed the Academy of Music to the Doors.

Lindsay, Oct. 24.—(Special.)—Sir Charles Tupper addressed a very large audience at the Academy of Music here this evening. The aged statesman arrived from the East in the afternoon and spent a short time at the Benson House. His speech at night was one of the ablest treatments of the political issues before the country that ever were heard in Lindsay.

An Enthusiastic Greeting.  
When the baronet entered the hall, accompanied by Dr. Vrooman, the Conservative candidate, and Senator Dobson, a storm of applause such as has rarely greeted any visitor to this town, broke out and died away only to be renewed with fresh vigor.

The quotation was made at Sir Wilfrid's own request.

Sir Charles declared that the Premier was a nice man to talk of loyalty. He stamped the country declaring that unrestricted reciprocity with the United States was Canada's only hope. He would get his tariff from Washington, but that was the highest in the world against other nations. England included. Was that loyalty? (Cheers.) When Conservatives protested that such a course was hostile to England, he replied that Canada must look to her herself.
