MINE HOST COLLINS DEAD.

Collingwood, Sept. 26.—Mr. Thomas Collins, late proprietor of the Grand Central Hotel, died at his residence here this morning, aged 62 years. The deceased had been a resident of Collingwood since 1887, when he came here as steward of the steamer Ploughboy, one of the earliest steamers which traded out of this port to the north shore of Georgian Bay and Lake Superior. He leaves a widow, seven daughters and three sons. He was a member of the Methodist Church, and was a member of the A.O.U.W. and the I.O.P. His funeral, which will be conducted by the brethren of the Masonic Order, will take place on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist Church, Collingwood.
