GREAT GOLD HOARD

Over \$600,000,000 in the Treasury of Uncle Sam.

Washington, Jan. 2.—The United States Treasury started today with more gold in its vaults than it has ever had in its history.

There is now in the Treasury building in Washington and in the various offices throughout the country, \$615,300,000 in gold.

These holdings are four times as much as the present holdings of the Bank of England, and a half time as much as is held by the Bank of France.

As much as the Imperial German Bank holds, and nearly twice as much as the Imperial Russian possessions.

The stock of gold in the United States Dec. 1 was \$1,230,673,772, showing a monthly increase since the close of June 1928, although the gold stock in January 1928, there has been an annual average of \$107,754,226 in gold.
