the organization of a Provident and Insurance Society amounted to nineteen or twenty thousand dollars a year.

presented by the secretary of the committee, showing the company's annual allowance is only \$12,500.

What the committee wanted was that the company should be in the following clause of the rules and regulations:

"In consideration of the subscription of the G. T. R. Company to the society, no member thereof, or his representative, shall have any claim against the society for any compensation on account of injury or death from accident."

Mr. Hall explained that, under a judgment delivered by Justice Brien, January 1, 1904, the consideration of \$12,500 a year is sufficient to defray the expenses of the society.

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
