Afridis Hold the Pass

Khyber Pass Recaptured by the Tribesmen

Who Indulge in Cutting Wires and Attacking Escorts.

Persistent Reports of a Serious Crisis in Persia.

Britain's Terms for the Chinese Loan of \$100,000,000.

Rioting in Paris—Serious Floods in Spain—Death of the Father of the Commons—A Royal Nurse.

EX-LORD MAYOR DE KEYSER DEAD.

London, Jan. 15.—Sir Polycarpus de Keyser, who was lord mayor of London during the year 1887-88, is dead. He was born in 1822.

PRINCE HENRY'S WARSHIPS. Berlin, Jan. 15.—The German warships Deutschland and Gefion, under the command of Prince Henry of Prussia, have passed here, on their way to China, and signaled that all was well on board.

CRISIS IN PERSIA. London, Jan. 17.—There are persistent reports of grave troubles threatening Persia. The British ambassador, Sir Percy Loch, has been asked to leave the country, and it is now expected that he will be replaced by Sir Percy Loch.

THE LIBERAL WON. The dispatch from London, published in Thursday's Advertiser, concerning the election in Plymouth, was transformed in transmission. The Conservative candidate was not elected, as stated. The new member is Mr. S. P. Mendel, Liberal and Radical.

A ROYAL NURSE. London, Jan. 17.—Princess Henry of Battenberg is the third lady of the royal family who is now authorized to receive the honors of knighthood. It has already been granted to Princess Christian and the Duchess of Albany, and now the Princess of Wales and her daughter hold certificates.

FAILURE OF A RELIGIOUS PLAY. London, Jan. 17.—The play, "The Life of John the Baptist," which Emperor William II. intended to see performed after it had been prohibited by the police was produced at Berlin. The play was a failure.

FRANCE AND GERMANY GOOD FRIENDS. Paris, Jan. 15.—It is an indication of friendship between France and Germany that the grand cross of the Legion of Honor has just been conferred upon Count von Munster, the German ambassador at Paris, on the occasion of the visit of the Franco-German Neger convention.

THE ENGINEERS' DISPUTE. London, Jan. 17.—Interest in the engineers' strike has shifted to the attitude of the employers. They say the withdrawal of the demand for 45 hours work per week, or against the differences. They will effect a reconciliation only on the terms outlined by the last conference. The official engineers' joint committee has notified the Employers' Federation of the withdrawal of the demand for the eight hours' demand.

THE DREYFUS EXCITEMENT IN PARIS. Paris, Jan. 17.—M. Anatole France, M. Zola, M. Deleau, head of the Pasteur Institute, M. Trautmann, and M. Roux, with numerous prominent doctors, lawyers and writers, have signed a petition in favor of a revision of the Dreyfus trial on account of the violation of judicial forms and the mysteries surrounding it. On the other hand, the students and public still denounce M. Zola.

DISASTROUS FLOODS IN SPAIN. London, Jan. 17.—A special dispatch from Paris says that the continuance of heavy rain in the Spanish frontier has done much damage in the district of Perpignan. The River Tet has overflowed, flooding the country for miles. The low-lying villages have been evacuated, and relief parties are rescuing the homeless. A large number of houses have been destroyed and a large number of cattle have been drowned, but there has been no loss of life among the inhabitants.

RIOTING IN PARIS. Paris, Jan. 17.—There was a popular demonstration at Paris yesterday, with a procession in honor of Gen. Felix Sausser, now retiring from the military governorship of Paris, and the commander-in-chief of the French army. Gen. Sausser stood in the window of his residence, responding to the salutations of enormous crowds. Ultimately bands of students paraded the streets, shouting "Death to the Jews!" and the like. In several cases car windows were smashed, and the windows of a house, mistake for Zola's, were broken. The police finally dispersed the rioters and made many arrests.

CABLE NOTES. The report of the escape of Lieut. Turner, of the British survey party, recently taken by tribesmen in the province of Mekran, Baluchistan, is confirmed.

The Queen has approved the appointment of Gen. Sir Arthur Powells Palmer, C.B., to succeed Gen. Sir Wallock Hart as commander of the Tiflis field force on the northwest frontier.

The condition of the health of Empress Augusta Victoria, of Germany, ex-empress of Russia, who is expected to leave today for the spring to some southern air cure. Her physicians still forbid her leaving her room.

The Paris Cabinet has decided that it will not agree to accept the interpellation today on the subject of the imprisonment of Dreyfus, because, the

ministers claim, there is no ground for reopening Thursday's debate.

A Constantinople dispatch says: The Porte, it is announced, is negotiating a loan of £1,500,000 with London bankers at 4 per cent, to be used for naval purposes.

A Madrid dispatch says: It has come to light that the recent riots in Cuba are the outcome of a pre-conceived conspiracy worked from behind the scenes, and that you have the object being to show that autocracy is unpopular, to turn out the Liberal government, to restore Gen. Weyler to Cuba, with Romero Robledo as prime minister.

THEY HOLD THE FORT. The Afridis Not Yet Subdued—Insurgents Hold the Khyber Pass.

London, Jan. 17.—A Calcutta dispatch says: Sgt. Walker, who was captured by the Afridis in December, has been released, and has arrived at Maland. The Port of Elgin, victory of India, has wired the government that the Afridis have been recaptured by the Khyber Pass, and that the cutting of wires and firing upon escorts have been recommenced.

THE CHINESE LOAN. Terms on Which China May Borrow \$100,000,000.

London, Jan. 17.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times says: Yesterday (Saturday) Sir Claude MacDonell, British ambassador to China, in the course of an interview with the Tsung Li Yamen (board of foreign affairs) stated that England was willing to assist China to liquidate the Japanese indemnity, and would provide a loan of £12,000,000, at par, to be repaid over a period of 50 years, the service to be 4 per cent net, including sinking fund contributions of three times the interest.

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
