

Daylight-Saving To Be Rushed Through Both Ottawa Houses

Parliament Hopes to Obviate Border Confusion by April 15.

OTTAWA, March 29.—The inconvenience at the border in connection with the train services of the bringing into force of daylight saving in the United States on March 21, will, it is expected, continue for a couple of weeks only. As soon as Parliament re-assembles, the daylight-saving bill, which is now in committee stage, will be pressed to a third reading. When the Senate resumes on April 8 this will be the first important Government measure dealt with. It is anticipated that the bill will be through both Houses and be assented to in time for daylight saving to become effective in Canada by Monday, April 15.

M. S. A. Records Not Burned By Rioters in City of Quebec

QUEBEC, March 29.—The exemption records of the registrar for the Quebec military district, the destruction of which is believed to have been one of the chief aims of the rioters who last night attacked the offices of the Chronicle, L'Evenement, fired the Auditorium building and brought about the intervention of the militia under the provisions of the riot act, are safe. At an early hour this morning it was announced that the records had been deposited in a specially constructed vault and were intact. A number of papers were destroyed, but they were of an unimportant character. The damage to the Auditorium building is estimated at \$2,000. There have been no arrests, and so far as is known no serious personal injuries resulted. Chief of Detectives Thomas Walsh had his face badly cut while attempting to make an arrest, and two clerks in the Chronicle office were hit by flying glass and slightly hurt.

Military men with rifles are guarding the newspaper offices and the city has regained its usual quietness, the streets being deserted, except for little groups here and there, discussing the affair. The mayor, having read the riot act and says the troops were called out on instructions received from Ottawa.

HOTELMEN OF U. S. WANT ABOLITION OF WHEAT PRODUCTS FROM MENUS

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Absolute abolition of wheat and wheat products from the menus of all first-class hotels in the United States was asked of 700 hotelmen by Food Administrator Hoover here today. The response was an outburst of cheering. Using their feet the hotelmen asked their right hands and pledged themselves to effect a 100 per cent saving in wheat to be sent to the Allies.

TWO MORE AVIATORS KILLED IN ACCIDENTS

Fort Worth, Texas, March 29.—Cadet John Scott Brown, of the Royal Flying Corps, was killed in an airplane accident here at 2:30 this morning. The accident was due to a spinning nose dive from 300 feet up. His next of kin is James H. Brown, Gabriola Island, Br. Col. Cadet F. J. Dwyer, of the Canadian Royal Flying Corps, under instructions here with the Royal Flying Corps, lost his life at 10 o'clock this morning, in an accident while he was engaged in a cross-country test. His next of kin is E. O. Brown, Montreal.

MAN IS KILLED BY TRAIN COLLISION

MONTREAL, March 29.—One man fatally injured and some small damage was done to the rolling stock of the C. P. R. when two freight trains collided at Grassie, near White River, Ont., this morning. The accident was the result of a misunderstanding of orders. The man who lost his life was Louis Berry, Merrickville, Ont., a stock man, who was crushed under material in the car in which he was riding.

CORP. NOBLE DREW IS INTERNED IN HOLLAND

Rev. N. D. Drew has received a cable saying that his son, Corp. Noble R. Drew, 14th Canadian Battalion, has been interned in Holland. Corp. Drew has been a prisoner of war in Germany for three years, and has been hoping for the transfer for some time.

TOO EXTRAVAGANT.—OLINTON, March 29.—The county council passed a resolution asking that the Government employ greater economy in the transaction of its business. It was also decided to ask the Government to send five more tractors to Huron County.
