GOAL COMBINE BROKEN DEALERS CUT PRICES

Complain That Competitors Went Under Ruling Figures on the Quiet

HAMILTON, July 23.—(Special).—The local coal combine has been broken up because some dealers complain that their competitors cut prices on the quiet. The price for hard coal has dropped 50 cents a ton, and it is selling at \$6.25 now. It is said that the trouble will not be settled until the fall trade is over. The dealers themselves strenuously deny that they have a combine, but they have had the same tariff.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of a man named Bakins, alias "The Gentleman," charged with embezzlement of \$10,000 from the Ontario Trust Co. The alleged offense was committed while he was acting as a bagman at the Stuart-street Station.

Judge Monck this morning reserved judgment in the appeal of Hugh Hayes, who has the refreshment privileges for Dundurn Park, against the conviction of the magistrate for selling ice-cream on Sunday. His honor said he thought the appeal ought to be granted, as there was no evidence that he sold ice-cream solely, and his honor thought the ice-cream might form part of a lunch.

The parks board is considering a proposition to buy the Robert Gage property of 50 acres, on Main-street, near the Delta. The price asked is \$60,000, and at its meeting this evening the board decided to inspect the property next Tuesday, as well as a plot at Point St. Charles.

Steps will be taken to stamp out the nuisance moth, which is making great inroads on the shade trees. Youths will be employed to gather the cocoons and next spring the trees will be sprayed.

Mrs. Selery, curator at the Dundurn Museum, was granted an increase from \$35 to \$45 a month. No action was taken in regard to the application to have the Gore Park fence taken down. The markets committee this afternoon agreed to ask for tenders for painting the police stations.

WEST TORONTO MASONS DON'T LIKE CITY WAYS

Say New Temple Meets All Legal Demands—North Toronto News—County Items

NORTH TORONTO, July 23.—(Special).—Councilor Parke was this afternoon removed from his residence on Glen Grove-avenue to Grace Hospital, where an operation will later be performed.

A meeting of the parallel roads committee will be held on Monday evening, and the court of revision will meet on Tuesday evening. "We are anxious to go ahead with the parallel roads business," said Councilor Irwin to-night.

The condition of Yonge-street from a little north of the C.P.R. crossing to the top of the hill, where the sewer is being installed, is awful. The mud is being carried on the sidewalks, and it is so thick and sticky that it is impossible to keep it from the sidewalks. The city has so far taken no precaution to keep the crossing clean. This is in striking contrast to North Toronto, where the council have men employed to look after this matter.

WEST TORONTO.

Treasurer of Masonic Temple Refutes Statements of City Architect Price.

WEST TORONTO, July 23.—The trouble over the erection of the West Toronto Masonic Temple, accompanied by the summoning of A. B. Rice, the Newmarket architect, to the police court, has aroused quite a lot of local interest as to when the authority of the West Toronto officials exactly ceased, and when the Toronto officials assumed control. No solution of the difficulty can be expected for a week at least.

When the case came up in this afternoon's court, Magistrate Ellis granted an adjournment to allow the city architect's department and the West Toronto Masons to come to a settlement in the meantime, if such a thing is possible. The directors of the temple, as well as the architect, Messrs. Ellis and Conroy, do not agree with the opinion of G. F. W. Price, deputy city architect, regarding the construction of the new building.
