**WOLVERHAMPTON
WON AT EVERTON**

Being Biggest Surprise of the
English Cup Fourth

London, March 8.—(Canadian Associated Press).—The biggest surprise of the association football English cup fourth round games, was the defeat of Everton at home by Wolverhampton before 53,000 spectators. Edmunds scored for the visitors within eleven minutes. Everton never looked like equalling them, but clear openings were presented to whom there was always blind shooting. Woolf, science at all, certainly did not show his class. The match was a complete accomplishment of a victory with only a tenth chances that were given to their opponents.

The Tottenham-Aston match brought together 52,000 spectators despite the doubling of the prices of admission. Tottenham won by a 2-0 score.
