WILLIAM DUFF ISSUES CHALLENGE TO CALDER

Denies Charge That Liberal Members Stayed Out of Commons
to "Save the Government" From Defeat on
Division—Demands Names of Members.

Saskatoon, Sask., Oct. 27.—(By Canadian Press)—Before an audience of probably 2,500 people, completely filling the Third Avenue Methodist Church of this city, the doctrines of the Liberal party in Canada were expounded here tonight by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, its leader; by Wm. Duff, M.P., and by O. Turgeon, M.P., who supported the opposition leader on the platform. Hundreds of other men and women were unable to secure even standing room in the building.

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Five Working Days Likely in Kitchener

Kitchener, Ont., Oct. 27.—(Special).—Local manufacturers will have to make arrangements this winter whereby they can close down their plants for one day a week and work Saturday afternoons in order to overcome the electric power shortage, according to a statement made here today by Supt. V. McIntyre, of the light commission. He declared the city is being cut from 15 to 25 per cent by the Hydro.

MACSWINEY'S BODY IS LYING IN STATE IN LONDON CATHEDRAL

Six Irish Political Prisoners
Bore Coffin to Gates of
Prison—Throng Lined the
Streets, But Progress Was
Without Incident—Body
Watched by Irish Volun-
teers.

London, Oct. 27.—The body of the late Lord Mayor of Cork, Terence MacSwiney, is lying in state tonight in St. George's Cathedral. A body-guard composed of members of the Cork and London brigades of the Irish volunteer army, dressed in civilian clothing, is keeping vigil through the night beside the coffin, which, shrouded in a Sinn Fein flag, rests on a catafalque in the cathedral chancel.

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MINERS PRESENT FRESH DEMAND, CAUSING A HITCH

British Cabinet Has Been
Summoned to Meet
Early Today.

London, Oct. 27.—A new difficulty has arisen, delaying the complete settlement of the coal strike, which this afternoon was believed to have been attained on the basis of an increase in the miners' wages as set forth in the earlier announcement this afternoon. The difficulty is serious, as indicated by the fact that the cabinet has been summoned to meet early tomorrow morning before the conference of the miners and government officials re-assembles.

POLICY OF SECRECY

At the last moment the miners presented a new demand, which compelled adjournment of the conference with the representatives of the government. Nothing has yet transpired as to the nature of the miners' new demand. The policy of secrecy regarding the agreement continued to be maintained, but apparently the objection of the miners was due to the fact that the agreement as drafted might have the effect of making permanent the application of the principle that wages are dependent upon output, and also to the idea that it might authorize pre-clude future nationalization.

U. S. OWES POSITION TO OTHERS' LOSSES

Boston Banker Says Her Sta-
tus as Creditor Nation
Is Unenviable.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—John Jacob Arnold, vice-president of the Bankers' Union for foreign countries and general manager of the U. V. Greene Co., Boston, addressing a meeting here tonight on world economic conditions, said the position of the United States as a creditor nation was unenviable. It had been built up as a direct result of the war, whilst the position of Great Britain, Germany and France, as creditor nations, had been acquired by the efforts of the first in aiding in the development of the United States, of the second in building up South America, the Orient; and third, in building up Russia.

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EMERGENCY BILL PASSES COMMONS

Measure Had to Be Modified
as Concession to Labor
Party.

London, Oct. 27.—The government's emergency bill, which provides for all contingencies in the event the miners' strike should involve the railway and transport workers, was rushed through all its remaining stages today and passed third reading tonight. The vote was 288 to 58.

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
