Attitude of Moslems All these possibilities will be discussed by the important conference assembling at Paris. It is perhaps significant in connection with the possible Bolshevik activities in the middle east and the attitude of the Mos.em populations generally to-ward England, that, whereas a fortnight ago it was stated that Premier Lloyd George had been victorious in carrying the British view in favor of excluding the Turks from Constantinople and removing the capital of the new Turkey to Asia Minor, against the wishes of Premier C.em-enceau and the French statesmen who wished to retain the Turks in Constantinople, it is stated now that the French view is prevailing in the

Paris conference. The British press is sharply divided into two d.vergent lines in connec-tion with the government's treatment of the Bolsnevist question. On sec-tion, strongly anti-Bolshevik, sharply attacks Premier Lloyd George, charg-ing him with responsibility for the weakening of the causes of Denikine and Kolchak by alliance with Prink.po conference ideas and various Bolshevik overtures. These papers also take the line that Germany is behind and in conspiracy with the

Bolsnevik manoeuvres. The other section, representing the olicy of non-intervention in Russia, attributes all the trouble to Mr. Churchill, the secretary for war and military defense. It charges the government with indulging in wholesale propaganda to misrepresent the Russian s.tuation and argues that the government has made a disastrous mistake in refusing to negotiate

peace with the soviets. The Star commenting on the statement regarding the Boshevik activties, describes it as an ominous hint indicating that the situation in the middle east may be made an excuse by the British government for nev and extensive minitary adventures.

A Serious Situation. Within the next three months, says a long semi-official statement dealing with the near eastern allairs, Great Britain may be faced with a serious Bolshevist situation in the near east, which would mean military commitments, according to expert opinion pased on official advices from the the-

atres of war. The Bolshevist occupation of Trans-Caspia may be regarded as virtually omplete, which makes the position in the Caucasus most difficult from an anti-red viewpoint. There is little hope of stopping the Bolsheviki from overrunning the Caucasus, and if they succeed they will be able to join Mustapha Remal Pasha (head of the Turkish Nationalists) and other Turks

for Mesopotamian aggression.
