Mr. Speaker: The hon. Parliamentary Secretary to the President of Privy Council has suggested that we call as a group motions 1, 7, 8, 9, if I understand him correctly.

Mr. Pinard: Mr. Speaker, I would like to give some particulars. The notices of motions for the production of papers which will be answered today are in fact the notices of motions Nos. 1 and 7 to 43 inclusive. Now, there are five or six different types of answers for various groups of notices of motions, and it would take too long to answer each motion individually. That is why I would ask Your Honour to simply call as a group first motion No. 1 and the motions Nos. 7 to 43 inclusive; then, the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources (Mr. Lamontagne) will himself specify which notices of motions will be answered by a stock answer. That procedure will be a lot simpler for the progress of our proceedings.
