The Parsonage house is rapidly progressing, and we anticipate its completion during the early part of the winter. The church has been neatly painted and presents a very respectable appearance. The parishioners have subscribed upwards of £200 towards the Parsonage, which, with the painting of the church, has called forth increased liberality and if we add the sum raised towards the clergyman's salary we see, I hope, proof that the people of St. Eleanor's have not dealt with a slack hand in giving of their means to the support of the church."
