Warden's Injunction Holds Up \$3,000 Grant For Soldiers' Gifts

Is Both Plaintiff and Defendant in Suits To Bar Action on Recommendation of Finance Committee; Returned Soldiers Also Protest

The quarterly meeting of the municipal council yesterday afternoon brought sensational developments. The finance committee had prepared a recommendation that \$3,000 be granted to the Sol-diers' Comforts Christmas committee, at the request of Mrs. J. V. Anglin, to be expended in providing Christmas boxes for the 1,500 St. John city and county soldiers at the front, the same to be charged to the patriotic assessment for 1916. As soon as the recommendation was presented, however, John F. H. Teed served papers on the warden, H. R.

McLellan, and the county secretary, J. King Kelley. There was an injunction issued by Justice Grimmer, in which H. R. Mc-Lellan, as a ratepayer and on behalf of the ratepayers of the municipality, was plaintiff. It restrained the council from receiving the report of the finance committee or any resolution of the committee dealing with the sum until Oct. 13. A writ issued by Chief Justice McLeod called upon the municipality to put

Finally a resolution was passed to secure the opinion of the council's solicitor in the matter. In doing so, Mr. Kelley presented an anomalous situation. 
