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## WINNIPEG PLEASED TO RAISE 7,000 MEN

No Difficulty in Western City Supplying Six Battalions

Winnipeg, Nov. 8.—Winnipeg is enthusiastic over the order from Ottawa to raise six new battalions in this city. No difficulty whatever is anticipated in securing the 4,000 officers and men asked for from here. It is expected that the call will create a stimulus in recruiting and that the men will be kept in the city for some time. It is known that they are wanted. It is taken for granted that the "104th" and the "105th" Garry Horse will recruit two of the battalions to go to the front as units.

Major Dan McLean, who is named to command one of the battalions, was formerly lieutenant-colonel of the 104th and has been on active service since the beginning of the war. He is now at St. John's, and will also take command of one of the battalions, went to the front with the 104th, and is now in the city. He has been recuperating, and his leave is now up, but he received orders to remain in the city. Major R. A. Gillespie, another named to command a battalion, is a former major of the 64th Battalion, and his promotion is a signal honor.

## CREW OF ANNIE M. PARKER

SAVED AFTER THRILLING NIGHT ON THE WRECK

After clinging to their wrecked vessel for twenty-four hours the captain and crew of the schooner, Annie M. Parker, landed safely on Sunday afternoon at Cape Hauld, Westmorland county, the schooner left Chatham on Friday with a load of laths for New York and on Saturday ran into the blinding storm which raged along the coast. She struck on a sandy beach 400 yards off shore and held fast. Owning to the heavy sea it was impossible to make any attempt to land from the schooner or to send help from the shore. During the evening the seamen sent a message ashore in a box, asking that a fire be kept burning to give them light and this was done. On Sunday afternoon they floated a raft, with ropes attached to the schooner, and the men safely landed. The schooner, which was built in 1901, is owned by R. C. Elkin of St. John. She was valued at \$20,000 and is insured for half that amount. The cargo was shipped by the Lynch estate and is fully insured. Fred Elkin left yesterday to arrange for salvage operations.

## RECENT DEATHS

Senator William Mackay.

Sydney, N. S., Nov. 8.—Senator William Mackay, M.D., died at his home at Reserve today. He had been ill for one week. On Sunday last he was stricken by a weakness of the heart while on his way to perform a critical operation at the Glace Bay hospital.

He was born at Earlton, Colchester county, on September 11, 1847. His early education was obtained in the "Truro" school and he graduated in medicine from Belleville Hospital Medical College, New York, in 1872.

Dr. Mackay entered politics in 1886 when he was elected to the house of assembly. Later he was chosen leader of the Conservative party in the house, and served in this capacity of representative of the county until 1897 with the exception of the terms from 1900-1904. He was elected M.P. for the local house in 1904 for the federal house.

He was called to the senate in 1912. Since then he has been a member of the Senate. He was formerly Miss Katherine Campbell-Sutherland of the Falls, Earlton, and three children survive him, one of whom is Major Dan Mackay, M.D., who is now serving with one of Winnipeg regiments at the front.

## THREE WEALTHY WOMEN.

Senators Cuzco of Chile Said to Have \$200,000,000—Mrs. Creff's \$500 an Hour.

Everybody knows that Krupp's is owned by a woman. The sole heiress to the "old man" was his daughter, Bertha, who came in for at least \$75,000,000. She is now Frau von Bohlen. She is said to know all about big gun making, yet to know how to bake a pie or even turn a dress. Her husband was made by himself and cost \$200.

Senora Cuzco, a millionaire of Chile, is said to be the richest woman in the world. She owns silver, copper and coal mines by the score, and actually runs a town, besides running a fleet of steamships. She employs hundreds of workmen, and her wealth is estimated at \$200,000,000.

Senora Cuzco is a Chilean. She is perhaps this lady's nearest rival for the preeminence in riches among women. Her income is \$400,000 a year, or more than \$400 an hour—Stray Stories.

## SHOPPING BY PROXY.

Chicago Club Has New Idea to Help Suburban Members.

The Brownleigh Club in Chicago, which maintains downtown headquarters and caters chiefly to suburban members, is the parent of a new idea. It has been discovered that many tired and foot-sore women prefer to rest in the club's luxurious quarters and have their shopping done by proxy. For the latter a staff of veteran professional shoppers have been employed, and the club members are enthusiastic over the plan.

One can not discuss an innovation of this kind with an entirely judicial mind. Admittedly, there is a proportion of women shoppers that approach their task with trepidation, and get through with it as quickly as possible. But not all, by any means. Some have a variety of wholesome excitements, and the bargain counter is numbered among them. Deprive the normal woman of the luxury of bargain hunting in propria persona, and you strike a blow at the magna charta of feminine liberties.

Shopping by proxy may be a welcome relief for those who live in suburbs and who have their errands in the city besides the replenishment of wardrobes and other shopping duties. When the new plan is thoroughly tested it may prove acceptable to a proportion of city shoppers.

Yet we venture to predict that, like Job's war horse, which "smelleth the battle from afar and paws the earth," the average woman shopper will continue to dispense with proxies when the bargains are sufficiently marked down.—Atlanta Georgian.

SUED FOR FOURTEEN CENTS, GETS TWELVE

Newton, Nov. 8.—Associate Judge Frank M. Copeland rendered a verdict of twelve cents to Charles R. Darling of Newton Centre, a Boston attorney, following a suit for fourteen cents brought by Mr. Darling against the Norwobegs Park and Middlesex & Boston Street Railway Company. The two cents, which Mr. Darling claimed for postage was not allowed by the court.

The result of the court's decision was awaited with considerable interest, as the suit was unusual. It followed a trip to Norwobegs Park last July, where upon his arrival, Mr. Darling was informed that no show was in progress that evening on account of the weather. When he made a protest to officials of the company eight cents were refunded to him, representing what was the cost of admission to the park, but they did not see their way clear to refund the twelve cents spent in car-fares to and from the resort.

Mr. Darling contended that the only reason he took the trip was to enjoy the show and that the ride, both going and coming, was a discomfort. Following the trial at which Mr. Darling conducted his own case, Judge Copeland took the matter under advisement.
