

NEW BRUNSWICK FINANCES

(Chatham World) (Chatham World)

The New Brunswick financial statement shows a surplus of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure of \$11.454.55, but to do this, \$66,283, received from the dominion government in settlement of fishery claims, is counted as ordinary revenue. A deficit of \$55,000 would have been otherwise shown. It must, however, be noted that the war contribution of \$90,630.62 is treated as an ordinary expenditure. Although \$730,000 was borrowed on treasury bills, and all of the crown land lease bonus payments (except what Mr. Flemming holds) are included in receipts, the shortage is \$147,423.72, which is more than twice as much as it was at the same
