PREPARE LANDING PLACE FOR FLIERS

U. S. Officials Ask No Official Reception to Be Given World Airmen.

Major H. A. Dargue, commander of the United States Air Service in Boston, and his companion, Dr. E. S. Bagall, of Haverhill, Mass., who arrived in the city yesterday morning to make arrangements for the United States world fliers' arrival here on their way through from Picton to Boston, were busy through the day finishing up the preliminary steps of their preparations. They called on Mayor F. L. Polts, Harbor Master F. D. Alward, Commissioner James H. Frink, Commissioner W. L. Harding, J. C. Chesley, agent of the Marine and Fisheries Department, Pilot F. M. McKelvie, who will act as their agent here, and many others. The afternoon was spent in looking for possible landing sites and a probable choice of No. 6 slip in West St. John was made. Permission to use this slip will be applied for this morning when the United States army representatives will again meet the Mayor and the harbor master and will also meet Commissioner T. H. Bullock and C. B. Lockhart, collector of customs for the port.

Gas and oil supplies will be arranged this morning. The matter of anchors and buoys was taken up yesterday with Mr. Chesley and was settled satisfactorily, these articles being supplied for the occasion.

Will Take Week to Get Here.

Major Dargue said last night that the fliers would not reach St. John until about a week from the time they left Iceland and that he and Dr. Bagall would not be here to greet them. Affairs would be left in the hands of Mr. McKelvie and he would carry out the details of arranging for the delivery.

Locatelli, Italian aviator, who is flying across the Atlantic, will call at Quebec in a continuation of his flight to New York, according to advices received in Quebec by the Italian consul. The aviator at last reports was at Reykjavik, Iceland, and will fly thence to Greenland, to Cartwright, on the Labrador coast, and then up the Gulf of St. Lawrence to Quebec.

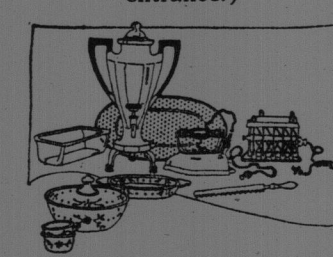

Captain William Bedford Seaman, who had sailed from the port of St. John on vessels of varying types for more than 50 years of an active life died suddenly on Sunday morning at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Joseph Price, 37 Somerset street in the seventy-eighth year of his age. Captain Seaman had assisted his sons in putting in a farm crop this spring and was planning a trip to New York this summer. He was fatally stricken only a few days before his death. He was born at Sackville and when he first went to sea he was a cabin boy on board a whaler bound for Greenland. In his voyaging he had sailed the seven seas and been in all of the world famous ports. Among the craft of which he had been skipper were the Grace Clashing, the Effie May, the Pardon G. Thompson and one of the vessels owned by the Sun Oil Company, of St. John. About three years ago he contracted blood poisoning from a splinter of wood which entered his hand and since that time he had remained on land. He is survived by his wife, two sons, two daughters and two sisters. The sons are Amos and William John and the daughters are Mrs. Joseph Price and Miss Lucy Seaman. The sisters are Mrs. Warren, New York; Mrs. Simmeratt, Douglas, S. I.; Frank E. Devon, and Fred F. California, and two daughters, Miss Mary McKay, Philadelphia, and Mrs. Charles Simon, New York.
