High School and Vocational Needs Feature Speeches. at Closing

The question of a new high school or vocational school was a live topic at the Christmas closing exercises in the High School today. The principal of the high school, W. J. S. Myles, gave his opinion that the building of a vocational school would not relieve the congestion in the high

The present high school building was characterized by Thomas Nagle of the trustee board, as the "meanest in New Brunswick."

Mayor Potts expressed the opinion that, in view of what had been said by Mr. Myles the school board should think over the erection of the vocational school and if it came to choice the high school should be given first consideration.

Dr. L. M. Curren, chairman of the Board of School Trustees, said he was in favor of the vocational school

because it meant giving the boys and girls of the city a better opportunity to fit themselves for life's responsi-The programme, as published in another column, was carried out and the chorus singing, under the direction of J. F. Browne, was a feature

The present building had been designed to care for 450 pupils and at the present time there were 690 pupils enrollend. The pressure had been relieved to a certain extent by putting classes in the New Afbert School and St. Vincent's boys but still the conditions under which the scholars worked were not what they should be and four of the rooms used were not fitted for the purpose. It would, he believed, add to the school population of the city but would not do away with the necessity for a new high school, It was not very creditable, to say the least, that young ladies were asked to study under conditions existing at the present time.
