

EXTENSION GRANTED FUGITIVE ENVOY

Case of Velez, in Hiding,
Presents Unparalleled
Cuban Anomaly.

Havana, Feb. 12.—The case of Carlos Garcia Velez, veteran of Cuba's war of independence and of several of her subsequent revolutions, presents an anomaly unparalleled in Cuban politics. Although he was indicted last fall for seeking to overthrow the government and legally is a fugitive from justice, President Zayas recently signed a decree extending his leave of absence from his post as minister to London, and Velez remains in hiding still talking revolution.

Velez came home last spring on his first leave in 12 years of service as minister to Mexico and Great Britain and went to South America to represent Cuba at a Pan-American conference. On returning to Havana he became dissatisfied and helped organize the Veterans' and Patriots' Association. Having been elected its president, he drew up demands for governmental reforms similar to those made by American Ambassador Crowder in his famous "moralization programme," and announced that the reforms would be forced on the Zayas government by revolution if necessary.

Up to Congress
President Zayas formally announced that he was sympathetic toward reforms shown to be necessary, but that congress was the one to act. Activities of the Veterans and Patriots stirred the government to extraordinary precautions for a time last fall and finally resulted in indictments being returned against Velez and a dozen other leaders. All put up bonds except Velez, who went into hiding and issued a proclamation calling on his followers to be "ready for what might come."

Meantime the revolutionary talk is not so pronounced. The secret police appear to have ceased looking for Velez and the indictments have not been pressed. One government official in a position to know said he believed President Zayas granted the request for an extension of leave as a clever way of indicating that he did not take Velez's activities seriously. Velez declared he demanded the extension because legally he was entitled to it.

If Velez does decide to go back to London when his leave is up on March 8 he will have to pass within a stone's throw of secret police headquarters to get to the state department for his final instructions.

Yanked From The Electric Chair To Spend Life As Living Corpse

Sing Sing Prison, Ossining, N. Y.—Giuseppe De Metteo has been snatched from his grave—to spend the rest of his life, walking, talking, eating and sleeping in a walled tomb that has a sky for ceiling.

But he is happy. Sitting in his solitary confinement cell in the morbidly romantic murderers' row, he was preparing to meet his Maker on the morrow via the rapid death of the electric chair.

But tomorrow never came. For "the next day"—his day of doom—was extended indefinitely for this man convicted of instigating the killing of another. His death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Al Smith.

On the day he was to die, the day harnessed lightning was to leap from his head to feet and still the life within him, he was walking in the prison garden.

It was the first real freedom he had enjoyed since May, when he began his death-house vigil.

On the day he would have been a corpse, had the court's sentence, unjust in this case, it seems, been carried out, I talked with him in the artistic prison garden.

"Life is sweet," he explained in broken English, shrugging his broad shoulders, and flashing his dark eyes in a gesture that could be only Italian.

His warm Latin blood was cooled by the chilly winter winds that eddied through the big Sing Sing yard. He rubbed his expressive hands to induce warming circulation.

"Now I want to go to work," he said. "I want to be a fireman—to work in the stoker's pits."

But for a few days, at least, he will have the freedom of the yard—the nearest approach to liberty at Sing Sing—until this man, who was prepared for death, again becomes accustomed to the novelty of living.

Lifers in Sing Sing are the best behaved of all prisoners, according to the officials. They all are hopeful—always awaiting the cherished day when fate will free them.

There is one life term—well into his sixties—with many bullet scars on his aged body, with no one on the outside to care. He would be lost without the routine of the prison.

Yet, he insists he has enough money laid by to care for him in his waning

years. He is always cheerful, carrying his burden of sorrow in brave fashion.

He is sure he will be released some day.

After talking to the man who was

snatched from death, the writer went over to the execution chamber. The door was locked behind. The electric chair, as unimposing as any in your living room, except for the attached straps, faces a row of pews.

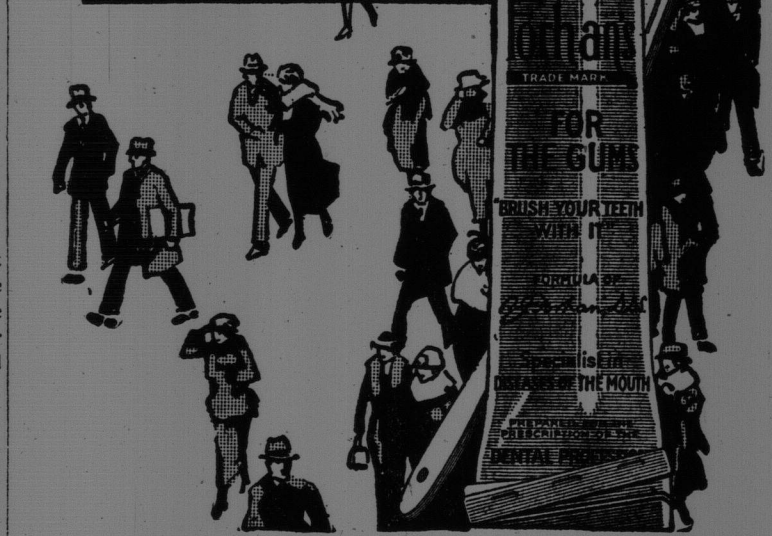
